SERGEANT YORK Clas, Fisher Wed. Sept. 2 - 64

When his platoon was pinned down by machine gun fire - Sergeant York calmly picked off twenty five of the enemy with his rifle. The rest of the Germans, so demoralized - that one hundred and thirty two of them surrendered.

Marshal Foch called it the outstanding single

performance - of World War One. And it made immortal

the name of the man - who was has just died in Nashville,

Tennessee. Passing at the age of seventy-six -- Sergeant

York.

I wonder what was the greatest battle, of

Borgeant Yorks. Was it the Argonne Forest - during

World War One? Or, the old soldier's fight for life 
during the past fifteen years?

The historians are not in any doubt - about it.

No one can write the chronicles of the conflict that lasted from Nineteen Fourteen to Nineteen Eighteen- without mentioning the exploits of the Tennessee sharpshooter.

Alvin York, a real hill billy - an illiterate out of a log cabin - when Uncle Sam drafted him. He tried to stay out of the army-because he had netther religious scruples against fighting. But the draft board - insisted.

And so - Sergeant York went off to war.

Who We arrived in the Argonne Forest - without his he did have with him squirrel rifle, with his backwoods marksmanship.

And in a single action in the autumn of Nineteen Eighteen - he performed a feat unmatched by any other soldier, of any ether army.

There's a note of tragic irony - in this brief news item on the wire tonight. Just as we are commemorating the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Battle of the Marne - of World War One. The hard-fought allied victory - which halted the German onslaught on September Sixth, Nineteen Fourteen.

Today, fifty years after, the battle z claimed who more victims. Both soldiers, they were fighting a fire near the Marne River - when a World War six One shell exploded. One killed - one wounded. A footnote to history - and the Battle of the Marne.

Later the Senate okayed an increase in social security payments to finance the plan. Now the issue is up to a senate-house committee and, of course -- up to the voters in this election year.

President Johnson made a point of acknowledging the accomplishments of the Eighty-Eighth Congress today - as he signed the Housing and Urban Renewal Bill into law. Calling the bill - "the most constructive attack by any Congress on the challenge of keeping America a fit place to live." The bill provides over a billion dollars - to eliminate slums and house the needy.

President Johnson has ordered an F B I
investigation - of the latest charge against Bobby Baker.
Which also involves Matthew McCloskey, our former
Ambassador to Ireland.

As you probably know Senator John Williams, Republican of Delaware - claims McCloskey paid a thirty-five thousand dollar kickback on a building contract. And that some of the money - disappeared into Democratic campaign funds in Nineteen Sixty.

Was the President surprised - by Senator

Williams' charge? Let's listen - to the White House

Dress-Secretary, Caye George Ready , "it's a compaign.

Press Secretary George Reedy who says: "Such changes are not uncommon. I doubt that he was surprised.

This is a campaign year."

A busy day -- and a fruitful day -- for Attorney General Robert Kennedy.

One of the highlights -- the AFL-CIO

New York State Convention -- where he appeared

before the delegates to receive -- a standing

ovation, and a resounding voice-vote endorsement

of his senatorial campaign.

Attorney General Kennedy - who tomorrow is expected to renounce that title as he campaigns for another -- off to a swinging start in New York.

Saigon - still buzzing tonight, With rumors and political manoeuvers. The latest, acting Premier of South Viet Nam - going to Hue in Central Viet Nam, To try and persuade Buddhist leaders and students there to follow Saigon's lead. That is - to agree wo not to attack the government during the next two months. Chief opposition in Hue - scene of demon strations and protests is to strong man Premier Khanh, Who is resting at the moment - away from Saigon. And who, newsmen were told - has no intention of returning Intil he is sure to he has the loyalty - of the army units in the capital.

Mednuhipe in Saigon , prices soared, Wecause of rumous started for political reasons - by stiends of General Khank, Who say America has threatened - to cut off assistance, if Fremier Khank - doesn't stay at the post. To which the Americans in Saigon say - not so.
