In Lower Texas and on into Mexico - a time of waiting tonight - and praying; against the threatened onslaught -- of Hurricane Beulah; a monster storm -- now-packing winds up to a hundred and thirty five miles an hour.

For a time today - Beulah herself played the waiting game. Coming to a virtual dead stop in the Gulf of Mexico - about a hundred and seventy miles from Brownsville, Texas; a kind of - reluctant dragon.

Beulah- will soon strike again. Perhaps tonight - around

UNITED NATIONS

At the United Nations in New York - the U N

General Assembly today reconvened for its twenty-second annual session. This one opening with a warning from Secretary General U Thant -- that a new war is inevitable in the Middle East; unless - said he - unless the U N can find a solution- to the present Arab-Israeli impasse.

Toward that end - U Thant called for private talks in the U N Security Council, As provided in the U N charter - but never before held. The U S delegation -- one of the first to endorse the idea.

At the same time - a call for a general strike on the Jordan River's occupied west bank. Arab leaders hoping to paralyze the area - as a demonstration of massive opposition to the Israeli conquerors.

Still in the Middle East - renewed fighting today in the strife-torn Federation of South Arabia. Reports reaching Aden telling a clash between rival Arab

Nationalists - at Jihaf Hill near the Yemen border. The battle said to have left at least five dead, - including a South Arabian policemen.

This on the eve of a deadline - set by the

South Arabian Army; for all sides to get together - to

discuss formation of a United Front. One Arab organization

- capable of taking over when the British leave in January.

That deadline now set to expire - at midnight tomorrow. And with it - all hope of maintaining the present shaky truce. The army pledged to take matters into its own hands - if the rival politicians are incapable of working together.

Latest from Vietnam tells today of an apparent plot - to wipe out Nationalist China's top delegation in Saigon. Enemy terrorists blowing up the Nationalist Chinese embassy - under cover of rooftop snipers; while a young girl was attempting to assassinate a Chinese press official # inhis home. elean aeross temp.

The sudden violence leaving at least two dead twenty-seven wounded. But the plot itself failed. Of
the top echelon of Chinese officials - not one seriously
hurt. And police quickly seizing three Chinese - suspected
of ties with mainland China's notorious Red Guards.

Meanwhile, on the fighting front - American

enemy artillery - making life miserable for rain-soaked

U S Marines.

Earlier, Radio Hanoi claimed to have shot

WHITE HOUSE

At the White House - President Johnson played host today to top Democrats in Congress. Chief topic - possible cuts in federal spending. The price that many Congressmen have demanded - in return for approval of the President's requested ten percent tax increase.

When it was all over - The Senate majority leader

Mike Mansfield saying the President has had promised to

"see what he can do" as soon as Congress completes

action - on this year's appropriations bills. Mansfield

adding though - that there are only a few areas of

possible pruning. And these - said he - in "projects that

usually are pretty dear to the hearts of members of

Congress."

Elsewhere on Capitol Hill - a complete aboutface today by the administration. Clearing the way for
establishment of a sort of -- domestic peace corps for
the aged.

Only yesterday - an administration spokesman telling a senate Labor Subcommittee - that such a program was economically impossible at this time. Now, however, Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz telling the same subcommittee - that the program can be started in about three months; and no need - said he - for Congress to vote additional funds.

The idea - to build a new community service program - run for and by older persons. Wirtz setting an age limit for prospective staff members - at sixty years, minimum.

FLYING

From the Federal Aviation Exam Administration

-- a sweeping new set of safety rules tonight; hopefully to

improving a passengers chance of escaping alive - in

the event of an explana crash.

The new rules starting with a ninety second time limit - for evacuation of a fully loaded plane; also specifying more fireproofing - and more and better emergency exits. A spokesman for the FAA calling these - "the most expensive rules" ever issued the nation's airlines.

America's newest eleven astronauts made their public bow today - at the U S Manned Space Center in Houston -- voicing confidence that the U S space effort will continue full speed ahead - despite a recent cutback in federal funds.

Dr. F. Storey Misgraves, for one, basing his faith on what he called - "the basic nature of man."

Adding that man "will want to pursue space" -- even as he has always pursued the unknown on our own planet.

Dr. Anthony England further contending that every discovery in space - will pay off many times in practical application right here on earth.

More on the subject of polls - from Vice President Hubert Humphrey, who said today in Washington that polls notwithstanding - President Johnson will be re-elected next year -- by a, quote, "substantial" majority.

Then why does the President appear to be slipping - even among members of his own party? Because - said Hubert Humphrey -- "Pemocrats always enjoy a little self-inflicted misery - about a year before the election."

ALBANY FOLLOW WASHINGTON

As for Governor Rockefeller of New York

he was busy again today denying any presidential

aspirations. The Governor telling reporters at Albany
he "no longer has the ambition to make the run -- to be

President of the United States."

Next question: Would the Governor accept the Republican nomination - if it were offered him by party leaders? His answer: "They have not asked me - and I do not consider it likely." The Governor adding there's only one candidate - as far as he is concerned; and that's Governor Romney.

DIRKSEN FOLLOW ALBANY

Senate minority leader Everett Dirksen - another who disavowed any presidential hopes today. Dirksen withdrawing himself from consideration as Illinois' possible "favorite son" presidential candidate in sixty-eight.
