The General Assembly of the U. N. today voted

The historic vote was ifty-two In favor, and five against - the Iron Curtain bloc. Two countries abstained, India and Argentina. Today's action, in effect - vetoes the Soviet veto.

Mystery in Moscow - unexpected moves in the realm of diplomacy. Tonight, the Ambassadors of the United States, Great Britain and France were called to the Kremlin - one at a time, at intervals of about fifteen minutes. Each spent about five minutes with top fo: $\operatorname{Gn}$ Minister Gromyko - and there is no official indication of what he had to say. The belief infondon is that the Soviets may be seeking a truce to the cold war in Europe, may be offering proposals for a settlement in Germany, may be suggesting a conference of the Foreign Ministers of the Big Four. But all that is mere surmise nothing known officially about summoning of the western Ambassadors to the Kremlin.

Thea are estimated to have from forty to fifty thousand troops in the vicinity of Unsan alone - forces of such strength that there seems no chance of rescuing american units trapped behind the enemy line. One was to their two year old daughter, another to his daughter by an earlier marriage. Both notes indicated he was leaving town on a mission, and did not expect to return alive. The U.S. attorney adds that there is evidence that the wife of Torresola- "Participated
