in fact, still going on. Most of the bombing was concentrated on the three biggest cities of Formosa - Takao, Tainan and Taichu. Tokyo claims that the Japanese have shot down about a hundred of our planes.

Formosa is the most formidable military defense of the Japanese homeland. It is a large island with a population of nearly seven million people, fairly bristling with defenses, naval and air bases. The assault on Aix-la-Chappelle continues to be the big story of the day on the West Front. Tonight Americans doughboys dre in occupation of almost ene third of the old capital of the German Emperors. They fought their way through two of the industrial districts in the city, Just before nightfall they were storming a hill only eleven hundred yards from the Attacenter. What is left of the garrison is evidently nothing but a skeleton fighting a delaying action. for Dispatches talk of a remanant remnant of only between fifteen hundred and two thousand Nazi aleft in the city. But even they are sorely depleted, without water, their food and ammunition supplies dwindling. The main body of the garrison escaped yesterday. The Yanks captured five hundred of them. just as they were trying to wishdraw

The Nazis sent two columns of some ten

thousand men with armor to reinforce the garrison, but
American tanks and artillerydrove them back in disorder.

According to the stories told by German prisoners, about there are still fifteen thousand civilians left inside of Aix-la-Chapelle; and they are in a sorry plight.

Tremendous fires are burning all over the city, and all services are shut off. A camera man reports that it is a dead city.

Meanwhile, to the east of Aix-la-Chappelle, the Yanks and Nazis are lining up for an all-out tank battle on the plains in front of Cologne.

Secretary of War Stimson today warned the Germans that if they do not surrender their cities to the Allies, they will be destroyed. In this he backed up the declaration of bieutenant General Hodges, who pointed out that there can be no middle line. So long as German cities are a part of the battleline, they can expect no immunity.

The German civilian population is in dure bad shape, if we may believe a number of letters to Nazi soldiers who are trapped at Dunkirk. These letters were dropped from an enemy plane, and the British red them, five thousand of them. They are all so full of black despair that the Allied authorities are wondering whether the are not part of a plant, a Mazi device to fool the Allies. One German woman writes to her husband at the front, asking him why doesn't he get taken prisoner. Another from Vienna, says they had three alerts in one day and ninety per cent of the people in Vienna are sick with fever and intestinal cramps. Another reports that the people in Cologne are in the cellars again, and talks about the fear and anguish.

According to all accounts, the witch had a high time getting even with the neighbors. She got into bed with one of them, and gave him a chill, scared the stuffing out of him and as he woke up and saw her in the moonlight, she vanished, slamming the door behind her.

One farmer's geese disappeared. Where do you think they were found? Clustered around the stone that had held the witch down for two hundred years. Then the witch opened the door of another neighbor's rabbit histories, shoved all the rabbits into the chicken coop, where one of them was seen to hatch an egg.
