The Interior Department has taken the first step that may lead to oil wells off the shores of the eastern states.

Interior asked the oil companies to propose specific areas for exploratory leasing. The Supreme court recently cleared the way by ruling that the Federal government and not the states owns the Atlantic off shore area.

Interior Secretary Morton proposed tonight that
the Federal government subsidize the electric power
industry on a temporary basis.

Speaking in Florida, Morton said a variety of subsidy proposals is under study.

administers the poison methotrexate - and then its antidote,

citrovorum; the two doses so timed that the patient's cancer

cells are killed - but his normal cells remain undamaged.

Dr. Djerassi adds that the mortality rate for lymph cancer - can run as high as eighty-four per cent; but of twelve children he's treated this way - six are still alive from four-and-ahalf to eight-and-half years later.

The American Cancer Society says 10 thousand Americans will be afflicted this year with the kinds of cancer the Dr. is aiming at and of these, 78-hundred will die.
