FOREIGN AID

There was a sensation in the Senate today; during the debate on the Marshall Plan. It was provided by Senator Kenneth McKellar of Tennessee, former President of the Upper Chamber of Congress, who at first was violently opposed to the European Recovery program. The Communist putch in Czechoslovakia and Stalin's gesture to take over Finland, mmdm caused Senator McKellar to change his mind.

The Senator from Tennessee says he is now convinced that Soviet Russia is preparing for war on the United States. He sees no other reason for the Soviets to take over one furopean nation after another, except to build up their strength against us.

Therefore, Senator McKellar announced that not only will he vote for the Marshall Plan now, but also he proposes that it be backed up by all our military strength. Put our country in fighting shape, says McKellar, with one distinct purpose, that if Russia takes over or attempts to take over one more nation, that the U.S.A. take the lead in defending that nation and all the other FOREIGN AID - 2

He went on to say that our government should notify Soviet Russis that if she tries to take over any more European territory, we shall be at the service of these nations and will help them maintain their individuality and their independence. The man who once led the Flying Tigers replied that they were both very tired mm after their long flight from Shanghai, where the General is now director of an airline.

He indicated strongly that he concurred with General wacArthur and Wedeneyer about military aid to China. But he said preferred not to speak at length about this because he is in the throes of preparing at a statement for the House Committee, which has first call on his opinions.

I was particularly anxious to know about one phase of thatproposal. Several people have been wondering whether our furnishing military help to the Chaing Kai-shek government would not create a situation such as that which prevailed during the civil war in Spain, would it not mean an out-and-out conflict between American and Russian forces on Chinese territory? Seneral Chennault's answer to that question was emphatically, No. The proposal to I furnish military help to Chiang Kai-shek would not entail the sending of American combat That troops. The Chinese will do the fighting. All we have to do is to make it possible for the nationalist forces to fight the Communists. To the people of China in general, Communism is repugnant, said the General. They have no use for Communism because Communism breaks up the family, and the family is the base of all traditional Chinese life. That is and point. I then asked him whether this would not leave it open to the Russians to send troops to help the Communists. Again

General Chennault said No. In the first place, Soviet Russia

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is not prepared, is not able in at present, to conduct a shooting war. In the second place, Moscow would first want to get all of Asia under its control, that is all of Asia north of the Himalayas, before they tried such a risky measure as actual military operations by Russian forces on Asiatic territory.

S_nator Taft, in a press conference at Columbus, Ohio, declared that the foreign aid bill which the Senate was debating today in his absence, is nothing like the original measure, the measure as submitted by the State Department. The Senate has already thrown the State Department plan out of the window, said the Senator, and hafter substituted one of its own. For one thing, the measure as amended provides for help for a period of only two years instead of four, and changed Marshall's proposal to spend seventeen billions to a program providing for five and a third billions. Furthermore, it would not be administered by the State Department as Marshall wanted. The money could be wasted if it were improperly administered.

FRANCE

Premier Schuman of France won another fight in the National Assembly -- won it handily. The argument was over the government measure designed to extract loans from business men -- and, from farmers, too, That is, it compels the people -- manufacturers, merchants, and farmers, to invest a portion of their excess profits in - bondo to run 10 years. the government bonds. FINLAND

Official word from Finland tonight -- all as predicted. The Finns yielding to Moscow with as much grace and dignity as possible. President Paasikivi and his Cabinet have taken more than a week to draw up a formal reply. Today the following communique was released in Helsinki: "The President of the Republic, today, in State Council, decided to reply in the affirmative to the Soviet government's proposal of entering into **mus** negotiations toward the conclusion of a friendship and assistance agreement and to propose **ini** that said negotiations take place in Moscow."

These Moscow negotiations will be conducted, on the Finnish side, by a delegation of six or seven members, including one General. President Paasikivi, we hear, prefers to have the conference in Moscow, because if it were held in Helsinki, he fears the Finnish Communists would stage demonstrations that would embarrass the Finnish delegates.

The Finns, we are again reminded today, hope to

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get a treaty like the one between Russia and France, a treaty of friendship -- not a military alliance.

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PALESTINE

The story came from Jerusalem just a few minutes ago, partially confirming the report that the three Jewish military organizations have decided to cooperate. Haganah, hitherto the moderate element, has signed an agreement that within two days it will combine its resources and coordinate its activities with those of Irgun Zvai Leumi. Tonight's story does not mention the Stern Gang mi which, according to previous cispatches, was also in the deal. The Irgun does not waive its extreme political views, that mfxr all Palestine should be an independent Jewish state, no partition. It just becomes a military unit acting in cooperation and under the leadership of Haganah.

One part of the story reports that this agreement was reached as a result of the agitation of a group of mothers of the Haganah men. They believe that a disciplined, unified command would avoid a great deal of useless bloodshed.

David Ben Gurion, future Prime Minister of the Jewish state, paid an official visit today to the British High

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Commissioner, General Sir Alan Cunningham; Cunningham's request. It is reported the conversation was a friemdly one and may mean a change for the better in relations between the British and the Jews.

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VIENNA

First Class Private Grunden of Portland, Oregon, with two other G.I.'s and three Austrin girls, was walking along the paved parkway in the middle of Vienna's famous Ring Strasse. But, they were in the international section, and as they passed the Grand Hotel occupied by Russian officers, where there have been many incidents, a Soviet soldier rushed up and shouted something at them.

The G.I.'s didn't know what all the shouting was about. But one of the Austrian girls volunteered the word that the Russian was telling the Americans to get off the pavement, into the gutter, where they belonged.

The Russian pushed the Oregonian, who pushed back. The Russian called for help, and the sentry outside the hotel rushed up, knocked the G.I. from Portland, Oregon, down with the butt of his gun, and then shot him in the back as he lay there. Then he kept on firing -shooting at the two other soldiers and two of the girls, who many escaped.

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The girl with the lad from the Northwest ran for help and brought an international patrol to the scene At that moment, Ernest Reed, a reporter on Stars and Stripes, also came running up.

A moment later the international patrol came along; and a few moments after that a detachment of forty Russians came up and surrounded the international patrol, which they outnumbered. The Russians seized the girl, curried her away, and are reported to be 'olding her incommunicado.

The bullet which the Soviet sentry fired into Jack Grunden of Portland, Oregon, as he lay stunned on the ground, passed through his back and into his arm, severing several nerves.

Colonel Bernard Hurless, our Provost Marshal at Vienna, says the incident obviously was one of deliberate provocation by the Russians.

SHOOTINGS

Uncle Sam's State Department/much concerned over the killing of two American women in French Indo-China. Both worked at the American Consulate in Saigon, the capital.

Just before sunset yesterday, a detachment of French troops on its way to the airport, along a lonely road three miles from Saigon, came upon the bodies two of the/American women -- riddled by bullets.

It all seems mysterious. What were they doing at that isolated place? The spot, says the **dxipxi** dispatch, is outside the Security Zone established around Saigon -- a zone to help make life safe from the guerrillas of Viet -Nam, the Indo-Chinese rebels, who have been fighting the French, sporadically, ever since the end of the World War.

The dispatch also says it is not known whether the American women were killed by highwaymen or by guerrillas. The jeep, in which they may have intended driving toward the airport, was burned by the murderers before they fled. Although presumably they were

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driving to the airport, they were off the route to that place.

The State Department has asked the French to make an immediate investigation.

SUPREME COURT

It is not lawful to teach religion in the public schools of the United States, even though the parents of the pupils consent. Who says that? No less an authority than the Supreme Court of the United States.) It is unlawful, say eight who tell us it is unlawful, say eight of the nine Justices, because it is contrary to the First amendment to the Constitution. That amendment reads in part:-

That amendment, says Justice Hugo Black who wrote the decision, "has erected a wall between church and state, which must be kept high and impregnable."

Among the eight Justices concurring in this decision is Mr. Justice Murphy, a Roman Catholic. The sole dissenter? Mr. Justice Stanley F. Reed. The case came up because a citizen of Champaign, Illinois, objected to the religious instruction imparted in the public schools of that town. VALERA
