In later remarks, Ford saying: "Together - we have made history here today; for the first time we have carried out the commands of the Twenty Fifth amendment we have demonstrated to the world - that our great Republic stands solid and strong, upon the bed rock of the Constitution."

The new Vice President going on to say: "I promise my fellow citizens only this: To uphold the Constitution - to do what is right as God gives me to see the right, and within the limited powers and duties of the Vice President, to do the very best I can for America."

That from Gerald Ford - our fortieth Vice President

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The President new energy czar - was a witness today before the Senate government operations committee.

William Simon saying that gasoline rationing - "should be an absolute last resort." Adding that a decision on rationing - will be made by the end of the month.

He stressed, however, that the earliest possible date for nationwide controls -- would be march one of next year. This - said he - allowing a minimum of sixty days - to work out the machinery of rationing.

Meanwhile, the fourth straight day of highway blockades - organized by dissident truck drivers. The truckers protesting higher fuel prices - and lower speed limits. At least one driver further suggesting the possiblity of a nationwide problem blockade - mach next Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The US wholesale price index was again up sharply and last month; jumping one point six percent

-- according to figures announced today. And him the main reason - we are told -- record shattering increases in fuel prices.

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Secretary of State Henry Kissinger was discussing today — the outlook for that Geneva peace names conference on the Middle East. Dr. Kissinger saying the Soviet Union - was cooperating very well so far. Adding that if this continues into substantive talks - it offers great hope that an Arab-Israeli peace can be reached.

In any event - said he - "I have no reason to doubt - that the conference will take place."

parley will probably begin - "with problems of a military nature." Meaning apparently - the task of the continued opposing troops. Once that is accomplished - he continued - talks can begin toward a permanent settlement; a settlement complying with the UN resolution - calling for Israeli withdrawal to pre-Nineteen Sixty-Seven borders.

Minister Moshe Dayan; even going so far - as to reject
his preferred resignation. "We must indicate who
must go"- she later remarked -- "but for any change
in the leadership - it would be advisable to wait until
after the election."

The election referred to - coming up December thirty-first.

Senate leaders of both parties were denying today the existence of a movement to force President Nixon
to resign.

Democratic Chieftain Mike Mansfield saying there isn't anyone - "putting any pressure" on him. Further saying he expects Gerald Ford to serve as Vice President - for "three years, one month and a few days;" meaning - all the way.

Republican leader Hugh Scott also brushing about a side a resignation query. No, I don't expect it." said he.

Adding, "what I do expect - is more questions like that."

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The whole of France was virtually paralyzed today by its first general strike in five years. The twenty-four hour work stoppage - affecting factories, transportation, radio and TV, newspapers, port facilities, schools, sanitation services, the civil service and power supplies. This in protest against a French inflation rate -- now running about eleven percent a year.

Amid massive security precautions - the leaders of Britain and the two Irelands were meeting today in Sunningdale, England; there discussing the possible creation of a Council of Ireland - to help put an end to continuing violence, in Northern Ireland. A spokesman saying: "The whole field of law and order, including policing arrangements and common law enforcement - is an area where the Council of &x Ireland might play a useful role."

The talks - continuing into tomorrow.

The White House again - career Diplomat Walter

Stoessel Jr. today was named the new U S Ambassador

to Moscow. The former assistant Secretary of State

for European affairs - succeeding Jabo Beam, who

retired nearly a year ago. The White House also announcing
the resignation of William J. Casey - as Under Secretary

of State. This to permit him to become the new President 
of the Export-Import Bank.

From the University of North Carolina, a report today on the quality of TV network news new coverage during the Nineteen Seventy Two Presidential Campaign.

Dr. Howard Doll and Dr. Bert Bradley - reporting that TV newsmen were - essentially objective. Adding, however, that some evidence of "bias" - was discovered.

This we are told - in the work of reporters

who con occasionally phrased reports - in language neither

neutral nor objective; who sometimes used evidence to

develop stories - which the evidence didn't really

support; who occasionally introduced into their narrative

-- gratuitous and uncalled-for statements.

Drs. Doll and Bradley coming to the conclusion that "total objectivity is often an ideal rather than a common practice in television news-casting."
