A federal court of appeals today rejected for the first time—

an age-old government rule, to the effect that a disabled

worker can earn no more than a hundred dollars a month—and

still qualify for Social Security Disability Payments.

The case in point--that of a fifty-two-year-old West

Virginia coal miner, who was ruled medically disabled,

because of crippling back injuries. Except that he has

been earning slightly more than a hundred dollars a month-
as a dishwasher--trying to support a wife and nine children.

Which led Social Security--to cancell his measure pension.

However, the appeals court reverses that today--in a landmark decision. Stating in part that "the test is not whether a man by will power can stay on his feet yet another day--but whether he is disabled" under law. The court adding that strict adherance to existing procedure would penalize "those disabled persons--who because of character and a sense of responsibility for their dependants--are most deserving" of public commendation.
