Senators. Then the President settled back with the

crowd - to watch the game.

A game the Senators lost, on errors. The White Sox, picking up two unearned runs - winning four-to-three.

The significant thing about today's anti-Castro raid
in Cuba - is that it took place in the Sierra de Escambray.

The mountains that the dictator claims to have - pacified.

Well, things weren'd very peaceful when the rebels attacked
a Castro militia camp at Sancti Spiritus. A hit-and-run
thrust -- that caused many casualties. The raiders, blazing
away with their guns - then disappearing back into the Sierra

Well, Back, to smile grimly a few hours later - as they
listened by radio to Castro making his violent marathon speech.

Meanwhile, sabotage is being stepped up - as D-day for the anti-Castro invasion of Cuba draws near. Havana is without water for the third straight day - following sabotage of the city reservoir. Many factories are behind schedule - because of broken machinery. And Castro is said to be arresting workers en masse - for crippling production with deliberate slow-downs.

There's some mystery about Communist strategy - in South Viet Nam. The Reds made no attempt to start riots in Saigon - during the election. They stood by, as pro-Western Premier Diem rode back into power - with a big majority.

But out in the jungle - the Red guerrillas appear anxious to prevent a final count. Today, they attacked the polling places - of the Viet Namese hinterland. Burning - ballots. Destroying the primitive shacks - used as voting booths. Overturning the jeeps - carrying the returns to central headquarters.

So there's a paradox - in South Viet Nam. The Reds, disrupting the election - out where it doesn't make any difference. Allowing the election to proceed in Saigon - where the victory of the pro-Western government was assured.

and the signet murder indictment ever presented in a court of

law. In fact, no one is quite sure how many human beings were killed because of - Adolf Eichmann, the mass executioner of Nazi Germany. But the toll of Jews alone - runs into the millions.

The indictment so involved the fifty thousand words. And, thousands of documents will be presented during the trial - which is are to be a long one. Also revolutionary because of the circumstances. Eichmann, kidnapped in Argentina tried in a nation that did not exist when he committed his crimes. His lawyer will argue that these points - make the trial invalid. But the lawyer has already been answered by the Israeli government - which holds that Eichmann's unprecedented crimes call for unprecedented legal procedures.

Tonight the English Channel Lefilled with fog.

The final toll in the Persian Gulf - five hundred and sixty rescued; two hundred and twelve missing, and believed drowned. They were aboard the British ship "Dara" - when she was rocked by explosions and fire. Tugs took the five thousand ton vessel in tow - intending to salvage her at Bahrein.

But - she sank in the Persian Gulf so farmers for storms and tragelies.
