First - the success of our Discoverer satellite, which went into orbit right on schedule. It circled the earth That the one that thirty-one times -- before ejecting its capsule. Which came down so accurately - that one of our planes caught it in the air over the Pacific.

The second capsule - was carried by an Atlas missile. The missile, arching seven hundred miles into the air, throwing off its capsule - then landing ... the target area five thousand miles away. The capsule war picked up by a ship - patrolling "missile alley" in the Atlantic. SUBS

Two of our atomic submarines made news today - in rather different ways.

In Charleston, South Carolina - the "George Washington" put out to sea. She's armed with sixteen Polaris She's to missiles.- and will be on patrol duty through the oceans of our planet for the next two years. President Eisenhower lailed the "George Washington" as one of our best deterrent weapons;threatening the Soviet Union with immediate retaliation, should Khrushchev attempt a nuclear Pearl Harbor.

The other incident took place - at Quonset Point, Rhode Island. Some of our top brass was on hand - for a ride aboard the "Robert E. Lee." Admiral Arleigh Burke of the Navy, General Thomas White of the Air Force, General George Decker of the Army - and General Lyman Lemnitzer, Chairman of the a lot of method, Joint Chiefs-of-Staff. Enough brass, - to frighten junior

officere.

RUBLE

Russia's latest move in the international money market amounts to a devaluation of the ruble. That's how the economists at our State Department are interpreting - the new exchange rate announced by the Kremlin.

At first glance - it looks pretty good for the Soviets. The ruble, to be worth over a dollar - instead of just about a quarter. Which makes the ruble stronger than the dollar or does it? apparently: And That's what the Moscow propaganda mill - is claiming.

But Here's the catch. To get one of the new rubles a Russian has to turn in ten of the old ones. And since ten of the old ones were worth two-dollars-and-fifty cents - while one new one is worth only a dollar and eleven cents - the worth of the ruble has actually fallen sharply. The Soviet currencydevalued.

KENNEDY

At his Palm Beach vacation home - President-elect John Kennedy has stepped up his schedule of high level conferences. He conferred today with Governor Ribbicoff of Connecticut - who is often mentioned as a possible Attorney General in the next administration. At the same time, Mr. Kennedy has lined up a Friday appointment - with Allan Dulles of the C.I.A. And our next president is due to meet our U.N. delegation - soon after his return from Florida.

The meaning of all this - Kennedy wants to be as fully briefed as possible, before shouldering the **beryific** problems that will descend on him when he enters the White House.

Meanwhile, we are told a little more - about yesterday's Kennedy-Nixon meeting. The main piece of that information - they discussed the possible appointment of two Republicans to the Kennedy cabinet. But no names - were mentioned today. So we can all start guessing. INTEGRATION The New Grleans school situation Tooko less hopeful tonight forthose who want integration. One of the seventeen parsons persons arrested in New Orleans today - was a Deputy Sheriff. Anthony Calabresi, a drawhard die-hard segregationist - is accused of reviling the police, and resisting arrest. He was part of the crowd that got out of hand - as four Negro girls returned to classes in McDonogh and William Frantz Schools.

Federal marshals again accompanied the children and saw them safely into their classes. After school - the marshals escorted the girls home. It took a hundred patrolmen and five mounted police - to keep the demonstrators back.

As the colored pupils attended school today - white pupils began to drop out. McDonogh normally has an attendance of four hundred and sixty-seven. Today - therefore twenty. *The other school*, William Franz, dropping from five-hundred-and-Seventy-six -to forty-five.
