CAPE KENNEDY

At Cape Kennedy - a perfect launch tonight for America's newwst scout satellite. Heading off into space even now -- for a rendezvous with the moon early next week.

The Scout destined for lunar orbit - if all continues to go well. Hopefully, relaying back to earth - pictures of an estimated ninety-six percent of the lunar surface. Enough to lay out a "road map" - for future manned landing on the Moon.

Chaos in Peking. The story today from Japanese newsmen - based in Communist China. Telling of riots between thousands of workers - living in the Red capital. Leaving at least three dead - and hundreds injured.

Reason for the riots - not quite clear, as yet.

Turnabout in Viet Nam - reported today from that strife-torn D M Z. Viet Cong attackers, wunable to wrest a key hill from American marines, wover-running instead a nearby special forces camp. Killing two American "green berets" -- as well as thirty-nine Montagnard tribal xx fighters.

One of the first places they hit - the camp's command bunker. Later found to have been blown apart - as if by a bomb. Some thirty additional Montagnards - also missing when the fighting ended, Leading survivors to suspect - the enemy might have had inside help.

This, ironically, the same special forces unit - devastated by an accidental **UxScalarization** US air strike -- just two months ago.

Here at home - a grave charge was published today in a lox Long Island newspaper. Senator Fulbright of Arkansas - quoted as questioning the war position of several leading congressional hawks; suggesting their "hard line" attitude on Viet Nam - is a reflection, in part, of flourishing defense industries in their home states.

Fulbright further said to have warned - of a number of business leaders and even government officials? whom he accused of viewing the conflict as, quote -- "a nice little war; not too much killing - but a big help to the economy."

Former President Eisenhower stopped off today at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania -- en route home from a California vacation. There discussing Vietnam briefly -- before returning to Gettysburg.
