A dispatch from Hanoi states that the first round of the final battle for Dien Bien Phu has been joined -- with the attackers having the best of it so far. Enemy units, making their way past land mines and barbed wire me to that all-important air strip.

The story tells of the Reds suffering heavy casualties.

Also that a record was set yesterday in the amount of supplies parachuted into Dien Bien Phu. And the French high command says Colonel de Castries now has bigger guns than any the Communists have brought up so far.

Here's a word of encouragement. The new chief of our military mission to Indo China believes that de Castries will hold Dien Bien Phu. General O'Daniel optimistic about the outcome.

The mystery of the Antipodes: - what has become of Madame Vladimir Petrov? That's the question Australian officials in Canberra are asking.

Mrs. Petrov - the wife of the political refuge who is receiving asylum somewhere in Australia. The Russian Embassy in Canberra sponsored a press conference, at wich Mrs. Vladimir Petrov appeared. She told newsmen that her husband is not a refugee at all. That the Australians kidnapped him. That's what the Soviet Ambassador to Australia says too.

But, Mrs. Petrov is described as sobbing throughout the interview. And when it was over - she, simply, disappea ed. Reporters called at the Kussian Embassy, but without finding her. All an Embassy spokesman would say was, "She is no longer here." More mystery.

Some Australian officials believe that she is now a prisoner in the Embassy. The Russian Ambassador,

apparently, receiving orders to keep her from making a free statement. So, the wonder is - is Petrov in the same predicament as Madame Kasenkina - who leaped to safety from the window of the Soviet Consulate in New York? Madame Kasenkina was a prisoner at the time. And the Australians fear Mrs. Petrov is just such a prisoner of the Soviet Embassy in Canberra.

The "ustralian Prime Minister still refuses to let the Kussian Ambassador see Petrov. As the Prime Minister put it, "We have a great responsibility to Petrov - who has taken steps exposing him to great risks."

Meanwhile, the Sydney Sun thinks that the Australian Government should demand the recall of Soviet Ambassador Generalov. The Ambassador, virtually accused Prime Minister Menzies of lying abo t the Petrov case. So the Tydney Sun says it's about time for Australia to expel Generalov - the paper calling him "an uncouth representative" of the Poviet Union.

TRUCHNOWITSCH (pronounced TROOK-NO-VITCH)
