ship was hit with "delayed action bombs" during that

Haiphong raid. The Kremlin further threatening to take

action by "appropriate agencies" - to ensure the future

safety of Russian vessels plying North Vietnamese waters.

To this - the United States replying that if
there was any damage to international shipping in the
Haiphong area - "it was inadvertent and it is regretted."
Adding, however, that vessels operating in a war zone must do so at their own risk.

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Meanwhile, the search for peace goes on.

With the United States - working today through secret diplomatic channels; trying to determine whether Hanoi is really sincere - about its latest supposed peace move.

To some - no question about it. The cryptic nature of North Vietnam's offer to negotiate - seen saws as merely an expressed effort to save face as much as possible.

There remain Others, however - not so sure. London sources contending, for example, that Hanoi is apparently ready to begin only "talks about talks" - rather than a real peace conference.

Indeed, British Prime Minister Harold Wilson today announcing plans to visit Moscow later this month.

Main purpose - said he - to try to persuade Russia to
reopen that Nineteen Fifty-Four Geneva conference as still the best hope for peace in Vietnam.

West Germany's Willy Brandt - also getting

into the act today. At Bonn - Brandt's social Democratic

Party demanding an immediate end to U S bombing of

North Vietnam -- as a necessary first step toward peace

talks.
