Along the way - tens of thousands of Central Americans presenting the President a series of warm greetings. With L B J noting at his last stop - that the name of the airport was La Aurora, a fitting name said he - in that Central America is in the midst of a new dawn of hope and progress.

## WASHINGTON

After years and years of talks - and
miles and miles of red tape -- an agreement at last on
reciprocal airline flights between Moscow and New
York. Announce today - by the State

Department. in Woodington. With Pan American for
the U.S. -and Aeroflot for Soviets -- expected to
begin twice weekly perhaps on early as next week.

The Fourth of July weekend just ended - marked
by the tragic loss of more than six hundred lives in

Blaiberg's recovery - attributed mainly to a new anti-rejection serum. However, his wife comments - "it's a miracle." Dr. Christian Barnard adding of Blaiberg; "he has the will to live - again."

At the opposite end of the Bamboo Curtain, 
At Panmunjom -- charge and countercharge today.

The United Nations command accusing North Korea -
of some twenty truce line violations in the past two

weeks. General Gilbert Woodward of the US Army -
also xxxx accusing North Korea of equipping its armed

forces - "far out of proportion to that required for

defense."

However, both allegations - rejected flatly
by North Korea's General Pak; who further accused

London - another shot in the arm today for the sagging British pound. With the Governor

of the bank of England -- returning from a weekend

banking conference in Basel, Switzerland, Announcing

a new credit line of two billion dollars - from twelve
free world powers.

Thirteenth participant in the conference and long holdout - the delegate from France - who is
quoted as expressing his "sympathy" for the Bank of
England - while adding that "the Bank of France - in
the present circumstances -- must reserve its position."
