Good evening everybody. Hurricane Gerda is posing a threat to New England and perhaps New York. The season's newest hurricane - with top winds of more than eighty miles an hour -now off Cape Hatteras North Carolina - heading for Cape Cod. The National Hurricane Center in Miami says Gerda could reach Cape Cod by tomorrow evening. Dr. Robert Simpson, director of the hurricane center, warns that it could become a very serious hazard to the northeastern coast, from Narragansett Bay eastward. A hurricane watch has been ordered from Cape Hatteras to Cape Cod - and that includes the New York metropolitan area. The storm is expected to intensify in the next twelve to twenty-four hours - as it moved north-north-east with rapidly increasing speed.

An unofficial truce has taken effect in Viet Nam. U.S. and South Vietnamese commanders - scaling down their operations. This in response to the Communist ceasefire - making the death of North Vietnam's President Ho Chi Minh; a ceasefire scheduled to last - as things now stand - just three days.

Here at home though - hope springs eternal. Secretary of State William Rogers asserting: "We do not see progress for peace in Vietnam." This following Vice President Spiro Agnew's statement - over the weekend - that something more may be brewing; meaning - apparently - something in the way of a permanent ceasefire.

HANOI FOLLOW VIETNAM

The mourners including - at different times-a Russian delegation led by Soviet Premier Kosygin - and a newly-arrived Red Chinese delegation headed by a second-stringer. Red China's Premier Chou En-Lai - having already paid his respects and returned home, - so he wouldn't have to meet Kosygin.

SEQUOIA

Hello Everybody: I have found the secret of eternal life out here on the West Coast. Well, almost!

After years of study - scientists report that while the giant sequoia has sometimes fallen to the woodsman's ax; and, sometimes has fallen to soil erosion - no one has ever known of a sequoia succumbing to pests - or to old age - or even to fire. For example, a recent forest fire out here in California blazed through a part of the Sequoia National Park - and it caused little damage to those great trees.

Main reason - the sequoia's tough bark - it's about two feet thick - and it's as tough as asbestos. In laboratory tests it has even withstood an hour's flame from a propane torch and can you think of anything hotter than a propane torch? One tree - completely hollowed out by flames - is still growing.

The chemical "annin" - is found in the bark and in the heart of the tree, and it resists insects, and blight - and even rot. Sequoia logs have lain in the forest for centuries and are still sound and sturdy.

The poet John Masefield wrote: "They are not like trees" - "they are like spirits; rising up with dignity, power and majesty - rising as though they had been there forever."
