One outfit of these extreme conservatives is called Jana Sangha. Its leader Mookherji. So fiercely devoted to the religious ways of old, they called him - the "Tiger of Bengal." He fought for a return of the time when India put all her trust inita in - the Sadhu, the Guru, the waters of the sacred Ganges.

But Mookherji got into trouble with the new govermment of India, and was put in jail. There he succumbed to a heart attack, but the rumor spraad - he had been
assassinated. Gexintaxinatiteat That's what caused the rioting at New Delhi.

London heard a frightful story, today, in the trial of the "murderer of Noting Hill." John Christie Peaklooking clerk, took the stand, and confessed, in gruesome detail, how he killed seven women. His lawyer, emphasizing the horror story, has entered a plea of - insanity.

The climax of terrifying drama came when Christie confessed the murder of Mrs. Timothy Evans, strangled in Nineteen Forty-Mine, together with her small daughter. The husband of the victim was tried, found guilty, and hanged. meekThe principal witness against him - that same looking the
clerk, John Christie. Today, admitting murder in the case of the mother, but denied it in the case of the child - for which crime Timothy Evans was convicted.

Today's testimony lot had all the sound of horrible mockery - in London's case for the murderer of Noting Hill.

All this is in response to a resolution in Congress, calligg for the information. The Air Force gives the most complete report - saying that it has been studying the question ever since Nineteen Forty-Nine. So here's the verdict.
"The effects of all the atoaic tests in the United

States are completely documented," says the Air Force. "In the imediate vicinity of the test site therewie no unusual
effects - even such as local rainstoms. There is no connection between atomic explosions and the occurrence of unusual weather conditions," says theAir Force.

So who is to blame for those vagaries of wind, rain and storm? Same old villain - the weather man.

In this era of the ultrg-up-to-date you see chairs of old style mogany, horse hair stuffing, plush covered sofas, ornately carved rocking chairs, tables with marble tops. No, not antiques.?

The Company that manufactures this unoxpeoted line is at Montgomery, Alabama. In existence - for nearly a hundred years, since before the Civil War. Its original business - to provide furniture for the plantation homes of the Old South.

Today, seventy per cent of the production is shipped North.
One article is a small table, with a top of
imported marble - in the best Victorian tradition. The table -
Just large enough to hold a family Bible. That item still sells the special table for the family Bible.
