As no doubt you've heard by now--Henry Kissinger demanding a special meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee; to put an end to what he called "leaks and innuendos" -- about his involvement in national security wiretaps. Adding if the matter is not resolved -- and quickly -- his effectiveness will be ended -- he will be forced to resign. Dr. Kissinger's remarks, in the midst of an Austrian stopover -- en route to the Middle East with President Mixon. Also includes a referencesto his past efforts as Secretary of State. "I would like to think" -- said he -- "that when the record is written -- some lives were saved and mothers are said he at rest_-I leave that to history; but "I will not leave to history -- my public honor."

PRESIDENT FOLLOW SALZBURG

First official reaction -- from President Nixon; who immediately issued a statement -- recognizing, as he put it, "Secretary Kissinger's desire to defend his honor against false charges;" adding that this is "the kind of anonymous Pres. Mixon attack--that has so poisoned our national dialogue." Stressing, that however, as far as he is concerned --- "the Secretary's honor

needs no defense."

WASHINGTON FOLLOW PRESIDENT

Here at home--Dr. Kissinger's request was quickly granted. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee agreeing to conduct a review of his actions--with regard to the controversial wiretaps; while, Individually, a number of were committee members expressing confidence that Dr. Kissinger will be exonerated. Senator Humphrey, for one, saying: "We obviously do not want Dr. Kissinger to resign." Further urging the Secretary--to "stay with it--cool it."

There were others though--who remained unconvinced; among them, Congressman Eilberg of Pennsylvania--a Democratic member of the House Judiciary Committee; who said the panel had received "positive proof"--that Dr. Kissinger "did participate in initiating some" of the wiretaps; and, therefore, may have "lied"--when he later denied it. Eilberg going on to sa y: "He's done a remarkable job diplomatically--but the facts speak for themselves."

WATERGATE

The trial of John Ehrlichman in connection with the Ellsberg break-in--was dealyed today indefinitely. Judge Gesell saying he was unable to proceed -- without the evidence which President Nixon refuses to surrender; adding, However, the Triel of Jung and defendenter mill begin as originally planned.
