SALZBURG

.. Ft Worth Tex comes today's news.

At Salzburg, Austria--an affair of honor. As no

doubt you've heard by now--Henry Kissinger demanding a special meeting of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee; to put an end to what he called "leaks and innuendos"--about his involvement in national security wiretaps. <sup>Dramatically</sup> Adding if the matter is not resolved--and quickly--his effectiveness will be ended--<sup>and</sup> he will be forced to resign.

Dr. Kissinger's remarks <sup>came</sup> in the midst of an Austrian stopover--en route to the Middle East with President Nixon. <sup>it</sup> Also included <sup>an emotional</sup> reference to his past efforts as Secretary of State. "I would like to think"--said he--"that when the record is written--some lives were saved and mothers are at rest--I leave that to history; but <sup>said he</sup> "I will not leave to history--my public honor."

PRESIDENT FOLLOW SALZBURG

First official reaction--from <sup>the</sup> President ~~Nixon~~; who immediately issued a statement--recognizing, as he put it, "Secretary Kissinger's desire to defend his honor against false charges;" adding that this is "the kind of anonymous attack--that has so poisoned our national dialogue." <sup>Pres. Nixon</sup> Stressing, however, <sup>that</sup> as far as he is concerned--"the Secretary's honor needs no defense."

WASHINGTON FOLLOW PRESIDENT

Here at home--Dr. Kissinger's request was quickly granted. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee agreeing to conduct a review of his actions--with regard to the controversial wiretaps; ~~with~~ Individually, a number of committee members <sup>were</sup> expressing confidence that Dr. Kissinger will be exonerated. Senator Humphrey, for one, saying: "We obviously do not want Dr. Kissinger to resign." Further urging the Secretary--to "stay with it--cool it!"

There were others though--who remained unconvinced; among them, Congressman Eilberg of Pennsylvania--a Democratic member of the House Judiciary Committee, <sup>a</sup> who said the panel had received "positive proof"--that Dr. Kissinger "did participate in initiating some" of the wiretaps; and, therefore, may have "lied"--when he later denied it. Eilberg going on to say: "He's done a remarkable job diplomatically--but the facts speak for themselves."

WATERGATE

The trial of John Ehrlichman in connection with the Ellsberg break-in--was dealyed today indefinitely. Judge Gesell saying he was unable to proceed--without the evidence which President Nixon refuses to surrender; ~~saying,~~ however, ~~that the trial of <sup>three</sup> ~~four~~ defendants will begin on Monday, as originally planned.~~

On another front, Judge Sirica today refusing <sup>ed</sup> to grant separate trials--to ~~six of these~~ <sup>the six men</sup> charged in the Watergate cover-up. The Judge noting that ~~the six in~~ <sup>those in</sup> question--all have good reputations and are not "hardened criminals;" ~~which means that their ordeal may be "difficult."~~ "Yes a sad thing" ~~said he--"but these are the facts we~~ ~~have to face."~~

# GATE

Some forty ships and more than four thousand scientists from seventy-two nations--were moving into position today right around the globe; getting ready to launch the biggest international scientific experiment--ever undertaken by man.

~~It's~~ "Operation GATE"--starting <sup>5</sup>Saturday. GATE standing for--Global ~~Atmospheric~~ *Atlantic Tropical* Experiment; an attempt to monitor the earth's so-called "heat engine"--or driving force behind all our weather; a band of tropical ~~air~~ *air* running from the Eastern Indian Ocean, across Equatorial Africa, the Atlantic and South and Central America--~~extending~~ all the way to the ~~westernmost~~ Pacific *Ocean*.

The full test to run for a hundred days--at a cost of about a ~~Hundred Million~~. Most of it--borne by the U.S.

But the knowledge we gain on how to better predict the weather--~~the~~ *scientists* will ~~expected to~~ *will* save Billions-a-year as well as countless lives.

**PENTAGON**

At the Pentagon--a special briefing today from Admiral Brian McCauley; the man in charge of the U.S. task force--assigned to help clear the Suez Canal. Admiral McCauley saying it will still take six-to-eight months--before the Canal can be reopened; adding, however, that all mines--have now been swept clear.

Admiral McCauley going on to say: "From the American standpoint--it was a well worthwhile operation;" in that "it gained us a great deal of respect--from the Egyptians."

Fifteen-year-old Rudd Long--dipping deep<sup>ly</sup> into the water time and time again; by ~~means of~~ mouth-to-mouth resuscitation--supplying his ~~little~~ <sup>enough</sup> playmate with life-giving air. Keeping it up till firemen arrived--and finally freed the youngster. <sup>A most unusual</sup> ~~and unusual~~ rescue.
