Vice President Nixon is receiving a lively
welcome in Hawaii -- the first stop on the world
tour that he is making with his wife, Pat. Today,

Democrats.

The British, today, ousted the government of British Guiana - charged with planking to set up a Communist regime. London suspended the constitution, granted to the South American colony, and removed the cabinet headed by Premier Cheddi Jagan.

The ousted Premier, born in India, is the head of the independence mowement in Guiana -in partner-ship with his Chicago born wife, Janet Rosenberg Jagan. London says, "It is clear that their objective was to turn British Guiana into a totalitarian state, subordinate to Moscow.

All is quiet, meanwhile, with British troops on guard in the streets of Georgetown. Soldiers landed from warships, now standing in the harbor - also on guard.

YUGOSLAVIA

The Yugoslav government now demands that the United States and Great Britain reverse their decision to give Trieste to the Italians, together with what is called "zone A".

The announcement was made yesterday, and was followed by violent rioting in Yugoslavia - crowds in Belgrade assailing the American, British and Italian embassies. Which were - stoned, in the disturbance, three Americans were injured slightly, cut by flying glass or hit by stones.

Tonight, the embassies are under heavy guard as the regime of Marshal Pito, the anti-Soviet

Communist, denounces the decision as "unjust"
and "lilegal". The Yugoslave want the port of

WEST GERMANY

In West Germany, the Lower House of Parliament re-elected Chancellor Adenauer. By a thumping majority -- three hundred and four to one hundred and forty-eight. GERMAN DEBT

There was a ceremony at the State Department
in Washington, today, when Uncle Sam was handed
a check for seventeen million, five hundred thousand
