From Egypt's Anwar Sadat - a plea today for "a dialogue - between the U.S. and the Palestinians." This in a meeting with President Ford - and in a later news conference. Sadat saying the U.S. should take the lead in such a dialogue - "because the U.S. is the main party in the game" in the Middle East. Adding: "If we are going to achieve any global solution to this problem - it should include the Palestinians." When asked the President's reaction though - Sadat conferring briefly with his Foreign Minister ~~then~~ ^{replied:} "No comment."

PRESIDENT

Meanwhile, an attempt to ease the impact of Mayor Beame's refusal to greet Sadat - when he visits New York City. White House Spokesman Ron Nessen saying: "President and Mrs. Sadat are guests of the President - and the President deeply regrets Mayor Beame's decision."

The White House also announcing the President will make "an important speech" tomorrow - on the financial plight of New York City. This leading to speculation he may have changed his mind about Federal help - and so a surge on Wall Street. The Dow-Jones industrials - jumping nearly Thirteen points.
