MOSCOW

The Kremlin is up in arms tonight -- over recent Red Guard attacks on Soviet ships in Red Chinese ports. In a note to Peking $-\frac{1}{\lambda}$ demanding an immediate **x** end to these "intolerable actions." Threatening to sever trade relations with Red China -- unless such provocations are stopped.

Inside China -- another bid today by Peking -- to bring the Red Army back in line in that so-called "cultural revolution." The official Army newspaper -- demaning blind obedience to future directives from Chairman Mao; who is said to be always -- "absolutely right." HONG KONG

Crisis In Hong Kong -- marked today by another head-on clash between the British and Red Chinese, Beginning with a demand from Peking -- for the release of five Communist journalists. The British told to let them go free within forty-eight hours -- or

However, The British, for their part- rejecting the ultimatum because of its abusive language. Placing the five on trial -- as planned. Charging thirty counts of sedition, # publishing false news, ## and spreading disaffection among the police.

In the meantime -- Hong Kong police found and disarmed wo no less than seven bombs early today. Then --? the rains came. Typhoon Kate providing welcome relief -- from the city's current water shortage; also putting a damper on further further Communist terrorist activity.

VIETNAM

News from Saigon tells today -- of a fourth straight day of stepped-up bombing against the Communist North. Including a massive U.S. air strike -- against the Duc Noi railread yard barely seven miles from Hanoi. At a cost though -- perhaps heaviest in months.

Radio Hanoi later claiming to have downed attacking wasplanes -- over North Vietnam. The Pentagon further reporting that two more planes -- apparently were shot down over Red China; after they crossed the Chinese border -- while trying to elude pursuing North Vietnamese Migs. MIDDLE EAST

In the Middle East -- another time-consuming delay today; in the repatriation of Arab refugees -- wishing to return to their homeland on the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan River. The latest hold-up apparently caused by Jordanian officials -- slow in processing the would-be returnees.

Back in the Old City of Jerusalem -- Arab Nationalists called for a strike today among Arab shopkeepers. Hoping to embarrass their Israeli conquerors -- on the arrival Ernesto Thalmann, personal representative of United Nations Secretary General U Thank.

No trouble though. Israeli police patrols -- foiling the strike threat. Israeli police also declaring a total curfew -- in the village of El Arish on the Sinai seacoast. In the wake of a strike -- instigated by so-called "hostile Egyptian elements." ISTANBUL

A related item - From Istanbul, Turkey, Where Eastern Orthodox Patriarch Athenagoras today announced plans -- to try to establish a new dialogue with the Islamic World.

The effort to get underway -- as soon as he returns from a fall visit to the Vatican -- said Athenagoras. Adding that "this dialogue -- will take mutual love as its basis." Hoping to put an end to mutual distrust -- between Moslems and Christians; and thus end a rivalry -- dating back to the Crusades.

The Patriarch -- as you know -- also a driving force toward reconciliation between the Roman and Orthodox Churches. Today expressing doubt, however -- that he would ever see both churches united in his limitime. At eighty-one -said Athenagoras -- "I am too old for that."

NEW HAVEN

On the domestic front -- an eight o'clock curfew was reimposed today in New Haven, Connecticut. Mayor Richard Lee attempting to head off a possible third night of violence -- in four racially-troubled areas of that city.

More on the same -- from Hubert Humphrey in New York. The Vice President tonight asserting that recent big city riots -- have put "our whole political and social systems on traal."

Said Hubert Humphrey: "There is no question that the few who have incited, rioted, looted, burned and destroyed -- must be brought to full account for their actions but there is a larger question -- of our broad national response to the challenge."

"There will be" -- he went on -- "no immediate cures for the problems which have been centuries in the making;" -- he concluded: which means "we have to be big enough, strong enough and determined enough? -- to fulfill both our international responsibilities and our domestic needs."

TAXES

Grudging support for the President's requested tax increase -- comes today from the National Association of Manufacturers, of all places. Need N.A.M. President W. P. Gullander telling a House committee that the alternative -- an expected Twenty-Nine Billion budget deficit -- would be "economically intolerable," as he, put it.

Gullander suggesting, however, that a six per cent tax increase would do nicely, thank you -- instead **?** of the President's requested ten per cent. At the same time -by asserting that a tax hike must be accompanied sizeable cuts in Federal spending. SCHOOLMARM SPRINGS

Hundreds of forest fires are raging virtually unchecked tonight -- through five Western states. Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Washington and California -- not to mention the Canadian province of British Columbia -- all aflame; with an army of firefighters -- seemingly powerless to stem the tide.

The fiery outburst -- worst in the nation this year. Sending flames licking through an estimated -- fifty-one thousand acres of timber and brush. The biggest blaze at Schoolmarm Springs, Idaho -- enveloping an estimated eight thousand acres of tinder dry forest.
