GOOD EVENING, but not from New York - from Detroit,
the Fisher Body Engineering building at the General
Motors Technical Center, where we're covering the
Scholarship Award Program of the Fisher Body Craftsman's
Guild model car competition - awards tonight to the
nation's best model car builders - some hard-working,
ingenious youths winning college scholarships to the
applause of a banquet hall filled with scientists,
educators and prominent industrialists.

An attempt to get a two-day armistice in the Senate's Civil Rights battle failed today - on the objection of Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon. His objection came after all factions in the Civil Rights battle had consented to setting the measure aside tomorrow and Thursday so the Senate could act on the huge defense money bill and other urgent matters.

Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson, of Texas, had sought unanimous consent to sidetrack the Civil Rights Bill and Morse's lone objection was sufficient to block the plan.

Morse declared that no legislation Johnson listed for action was more pressing than the Civil Rights Bill. He said that "the demand across America is that we act -- the eyes of America are on this parliamentary body."

Just before he made his objection, Morse shouted: "Now is the time to hold the line. Now is the time to say there will be no retreat, no truct, no armistice."

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There are some 175 bills backed up on the Senate calendar - piled up during these last three weeks while the civil rights battle has raged.

And today, politics rearing its ugly head - an implied charge by the Democratic leader in the Senate,

Lyndon Johnson, that his opposite number, the Republican leader, Bill Knowland, is playing for presidential votes.

Knowland had said his pro-civil rights forces

would stay in Washington all winter to fight through the

administration proposal. Johnson, from Texas, says that

is just a hob-goblin - and that an effective bill can

be passed if - as he put it - we appeal to the best in

men. And, apparently referring to the fact Bill

Knowland is mentioned as a 1960 GOP presidential

possibiltiy, Senator Johnson added: - "Some people around here may be more concerned with winning votes than in giving anyone the right to vote."

VERTIJET

The wonders of the modern world, were displayed again today - this time in front of the Pentagon in Washington, the spectators - top brass and some amazed passers-by.

A machine rose straight up in front of the Pentagon on a searing jet blast, climbed rapidly and flew into the clouds.

It was the "Vatijet," an experimental craft s
sponsored by the air force and the Navy. Then it
followed the route of the final acceptance flight of the
first military aircraft, flown by the Wright Brothers
this same day in July - but 48 years ago.

That flight from Fort Meyer, Va., over Alexandria and back made military history.

Today's ascent by a jet plane from a standing start did too - in the presence of members of the joint Chiefs of Staff and air officials of all the military services.

The "Vertijet," manufactured by Ryan Aeronautical Co., was flown by the company's Chief Engineering test pilot, Peter F. Girard.

He took off from a contraption that looked something like a hat-rack. Under the nose of the plane, which when in level flight looks like a modern fighter plane, is a metal hook. Giard started with the hook over a metal rack at the top of a mobile platform. Turning on full jet power, Girard blasted off the platform, slowly backed his machine away, turned slowly, then gave it another push of power and took off at high speed.

Upon his return, Girard turned the aircraft's nose upward and slid down, then in that vertical position moved slowly toward the platform and hooked back onto the rack. A new member of the marvelous age.

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An echo of the roaring twenties today - an unpleasant echo, and the sound brought no comfort to the ears of Nathan Leopold.

It was back in the spring of 1924 - thirty-three long years ago - when young Leopold and Richard Loeb committed their crime that shocked a nation. Brilliant graduate students at the University of Chicago, they were. But in their minds something snapped, and ust for a thrill, they kidnapped and murdered Bobby Franks. He was 14, the son of a wealthy manufacturer.

It was a cold-blooded affair - their scientific attempt at the perfect crime.

But Leopold and Loeb were tracked down. The famed defense lawyer, Clarence Darrow, saved them from the death penalty - but they went to prison for life. Loeb died there in a prison brawl - twenty-one years ago.

Today Leopold tried once more for freedom But

Illinois Governor Stratton turned him down - refused his

request for clemency, left him behind the bars that have encompassed most of his life.

Believed to be - one hundred million years old. After which length of time, it's unlikely that those Frenchmen will be able to cook up an omelette of dinosaur eggs.
