A crowd was gathered, this afternoon, before a Red brick house on New York's East Ninety-first Street. Fifty news reporters and Cameramen - and a throng of neighbors, attracted by the excitement. They waited until nineteen minutes after three, when the door of the house opened - and out came President - elect Eisenhower. Followed by General of the Army Bouglas Mac Arthur. So that was the big news-the much debated headline meeting had taken place.

It had been a secret until after the two Generals were actually in the conference. General Ike had left the Hotel Commodore at about a quarter to one. The newsmen, covering Elsenhower head-quarters, not knowing his destination.

Then, a few minutes later, a spokesman announced - that the President-elect was meeting General MacArthur at the home of John Foster Dulles, named to be Secretary of State in the Eisenhower Administration. You can imagine the rush - as reporters and photographers made a bee-line for the red brick house on East ninety first Street.

The crowd raised a cheer, when Eisenhower appeared, followed by MacArthur. The cameras were in action, and the two Generals spoke to the reporters.

The President-elect said: "We had a very fine talk on the General subject of Peace. It was satisfactory in every way. I hope that my old and respected commander will say a few words to you."

General MacArthur did. Speaking to the newsmen as follows:
"I've just had a meeting with an old friend and comrade" he said.
"We discussed problems of Peace in Korea and the World generally.

I joined him in hoping that it will bear fruit."

That's virtually all we know about the famous convertion - which lasted for three hours and a half. Later, it was announced - there would be no formal statement. So we'll have to be content with those remarks by the two Generals. They talked about Peace in Korea, and discussed the general subject of Peace.

The city of Madras in Southern India, is the scene of strange agitation, as millions of Hindus hail-a new saint. But this religious angle is all tied in with politids—even Communism.

So now, his disciple, Potti Sriramulu, in the cause of the Andhras, went on a fast. But he played it out to the bitter end - going without food for fifty-eight days.
