What with Paris peace talks apparently talled hang up on diplomatic niceties -- an attempt today at spelling out U S policy in bex the simplest clearest of terms. At the Pentagon - U S Defense Secretary Clark Clifford calling for "some kind of arrangement" some definite "signal" of a Communist de-escalation, which must come - said he - before that can be a complete bombing halt over North Vietnam.

This the "missing factor" up to now - Clifford went on. The missing ingredient - without which 4 President Johnson will not take the risk of placing American lives in "greater jeopardy."

What about that apparent ground lull in Vietnam in recent weeks? True enough - said Clifford the fighting has tailed off - since those two major enemy offensives earlier this year. However, the over-all American death tex rate -- is still nearly the same this year as last - said he.

VIETNAM FOLLOW PENTAGON

Underscoring the secretary's remarks - a sharp resurgence of ground fighting today near the D M Z where a force of U S Marines - intercepted an estimated six hundred enemy infiltrators. First reports indicating at least forty Viet Cong dead - as U S reinforcements poured into the area.

Meanwhile, South Vietnamese President Ehieu -Wadtouring the northern provinces today, Noting signs of an enemy build-up - that could lead to a new offensive "very soon" -- said he' perhaps - within three weeks.

DESMOINES

On the political front here at home - Iowa's Governor Hughes gradbed the biggest headlines today. Giving up his role as a favorite son candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination - thereby releasing the forty-six vote Iowa delegation. Reason - said Hughes: Because of his new role - as chairman of a group working for a "free and open" democratic convention. This, seen as another boost for Vice President Hubert Humphrey - who is an said to have strong support in the Iowa delegation. Although backers of Senators

McCarthy and McGovern - claiming they, too, have

"some votes in there."

MISSION BAY

On the Republican side - at Mission Bay, California -- Richard Nixon conferred today with this year's G O P congressional campaign chiefs. Senator Murphy of California and Congressman Wilson also of California - predicting the Republicans will win control of the House for the first time in fourteen years. Also predicting a gain of about twelve seats in the Senate - though not enough to claim a majority.

KUALA LUMPUR

Malaysian riot police used clubs and tear gas today - to break up a violent demonstration outside azimatement a federal prison in Kuala Lumpur. The rock throwing, bottle-throwing demonstrators - protesting the scheduled execution of thirteen Malaysian youths convicted of associating with Indonesian agents - when their two countries were involved in that so-called "confrontation" a couple of years ago.

Under Malaysian law - only state rulers can stay the executions. But the state fulers so far - have turned down all requests for clemency. SEOUL
