In Washington, Attorney General John Mitchell was praising the work of Capitol police in dealing with last week's anti-war demonstrations. Also expressing hope that "Washington's decisive opposition to mob force - will set an example for other communities to do the same;" in which case -said he -"we will see an end to the extremist practiceof running rough-shod over the rights of others."

As to charges that some of those arrested were denied their rights Mitchell said- "Nothing else
could have been done - unless the police were to let the mob rule the city." And he added," what's more,
if Hitler's Brown Shirts had been similarly stopped
forty years ago'the world might have been spared a whole era of violence and misery."
