The Soviets make another change --
Sokolovsky leaves his Berlin post. The Red radio
 at Berlin, has been removed, and become sing deputy Minister of the Soviet Armed Forces.

Somerset Another move in what armed
seems to be a large scale, long-continued shakeup. And immediately deep meanings are sought. Marshall Sokolovsky at Berlin has been the toughest of Red soldiers in opposition to the Western allies. Hence, his removal brings the quick surmise from abroad --
that it's a sign of a softer Soviet attitude, part of a peace offensive. But, at the same time, the tough Sokolovsky becomes First Deputy minister of the Red Armed Forces. Which might indicate a toughening of attitude at the very center, Moscow. So, we have the usual enlightenment - it's either a case of "yes" or "no".

Today there is official announcement of the
fate of two American soldiers who went $A W O L$ in
Germany, and wandered into Red Czechoslovakia. They have been sentenced to long terms in prison as American spies. This is revealed by the official news agency of Communist Czechoslovakia, which states that Privates George Jones of Owensboro, Kentucky and Clarence Hill of Jackson, Mississippi, have been tried in secret by the Red tribunal, on charges of espionage - Jones doomed to ten years, at hard labor; Hill to twelve years.

This ends a mystery which began last December when the two soldiers disappeared from their units in Germany. No word was heard from them, until January, when one, Clarence Hill, got a letter through to the American Embassy in Prague. The message read as follows: Myself and my friend are being held for crossing the boundary without authority papers. We have been questioned, but nothing has been done about returning us to the U. S. zone in Germany."

American diplomatic officials made repeated attempts to procure the release of the two. But were not even given permission to visit them. So now the news - the two American soldiers condemned to long terms of Red imprisonment.

The 0. S. Embassy at Prague has entered a formal protest against the convictions, and calls the charge of espionage -- preposterous.

The Norwegian Parliament votes to join the North Atlantic Security Pact. In the session tonight the Norwegian Reds howled in opposition, and staged angry demonstrations. But the vote was one-hundred-and-thirty to thirteen in favor of lining up rixth with the Vest.

The Army authorities today were studying a remarkable story -- related by a Colonel sent to prison two years ago. In Nineteen Forty-seven, Colonel Edward J. Murray of Palo Alto, California, was convicted by a court martial of smuggling ninety-thousand dollars worth of uncut diamonds from Japan to the United States. He was sentenced to five years in prison, of which term he has served nearly two years. So now he asks for a writ of Habaes Corpus to procure his release, and gives a new explanation of the diamonds he brought to this country -- a story that he did not tell at the court martial. Why not? He says he refrained from disclosing the facts, because, he thought his attorney at the trial was incapable of taking full advantage of the evidence. So what's the story now brought forward -after nearly two years of imprisonment?

Colonel Ed J. Murray of Pablo Alto relates that, While serving as an Army Colonel in Japan he was traveling by jeep from Yokahoma to Tokyo -- and on the road, he saw 3

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men fighting. He stopped his jeep and got out.
"As I approached" he relates, "two of the men got up and ran. The other arose from the ground and thanked me for saving his life. There was, he goes on, "a big car parked at the side of the road, and ${ }^{2}$ portly elderly gentleman opened the door and also thanked me. I asked him what was doing on, and he replied: 'Just a slight mistake -- everything is all right'." To which Murray adds that the man in the automobile took his name and address, and drove on.

Such, according to the story, was the encounter between the U.S. Colonel and the portly elderly gentleman, at night, on the highway from Yokahoma to IE E Tokyo. Which was followed several days later by another incident at night. Murray says that he was in his Tokyo hotel room, when there was a knock on the door. He answered and a Japanese Whom he did not recognize, entered. This unknown Japanese, after asking the name of the American Colonel,

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and being told - placed an envelope on the desk "I) have
of the hotel room. Ere been directed to deliver these to you" said the stranger. "I have done so, goodnight". And he left.

In the envelope were five hundred uncut diamonds, and Murray says he believed they were a reward from the portly elderly gentleman in whose behalf he had intervened on the road several nights before. ne says he had no idea what the diamonds were worth, and was not aware that he was required to declare them at customs - upon his return to the United States.

I thought I'd bring them home to my wife."

Two airplane speed records were made today -- one for the cross continental flight mad in a single reciprocating engine type pilot Joe Debona flew from Burbank, California to New York's LaGuardia field in five-hours-and-five seconds. He did it in a souped up F-Fifty-one belonging to the actor Jimmy Stewart. He landed with only thirty gallons of gasoline left, enough for seven more minutes in the air. Flying coast to coast in a mere few seconds more than five hours Joe DeBona shattered the previous record, for single reciproacting engine plane made by pilot Paul Manta -- more than a year ago.

The second record set today was made by that same Paul manta, who flew from San Francisco to Los Angeles in forty-nine-minutes-and-thirty-two Infin seconds, a record for propeller driven planes. All of which, of course does not concern the dazzling speed of jet.

The rent control bill was passed by Congress today in rapid fire fashion - first by the Senate, then immediately by the House of Representatives. In the senate a Republican move to send rent control back to the committee was defeated, and then the vote :- seventy-rigt eight to eleven. ${ }^{\text {Pu }}$ ouse approval was by a majority of Two-sixty-two to oneaforty-four. The bill is a compromise, which extends rent control until June Thirtieth, nIneteen Fifty, -- and has a "local option" clause which would allow local government to raise the restrictions with the consent of State Governors.

Well, here at Arrowhead Springs, California I've been finding things out through information from one of the greatest hotel enterprises in America, that of Conrad Hilton, head of the nation's largest group of hotels. It includes such famous caravanserai f as the Stevens and Palmer House in Chicago; the Plaza and Roosevelt in New York; the Mayflower in Washington; not to mention hostelries as far away


So here's the figure. For kin most hotels
eighty-two percent. That is, eighty-two percent of the rooms must be occupied, to break even, and above that figure -- a profit. But there are exceptions. One is the Stevens in Chicago, the
world's largest hotel. It cost Twenty -eight million to build, butlater Conrad Hilton bought it for Seven ad a half million, and the hotel would cost Forty-two million to replace at the present scale of prices. The Stevens serves a million people a month, either renting them rooms or selling them articles. So, with that giant volume of business, the world's largest hotel has a low breakeven point. With sixty percent of the rooms occupied, it begins to show a profit.

Palmer House -- that because of the renting of stores in the hotel building. The store rentals come to a Million a year -- the highest in the hotel business.

finance. Conrad Hilton recently purchased the Arrowhead Springs Hotel - which has a long ${ }^{\text {complice }}$ history. Americans had their attention drawn to the site first by a giant arrow marked on the side of a mountain - a mark made by the Indians. The arrow

The price Conrad Hilton paid several weeks ago was Two Million after the place had passed through a bewildering series of ownerships. - The Assistant 4 anger tells me that he has been here for three years, during which time he has worked for four different owners.

The University of Southern California announces - the world's thinnest slicing machine. If you take the thickness of an inch, this contraption will get five hundred thousand slices out of it. Sounds like something to slice the ham you sometimes get in sandwiches.

But that is not the purpose at all. That slicing machine was devised to produce sheets of organic tissue thin enough for the electron-microscope the microscope so powerful that some day it may enable the human eye to see the atom. Until now, they've had to study tissue twenty -five thousand slices to the
 Daniel Peace and Robert Baker, both professors in the school of medicine, went ahead and invented the new gadget.

They say the already, the electron-
microscope, with that thinnest of slicing, has been able to detect the genes in the chromosomes of the fruit fly - those genes being the units of heredity.

The Government of Iran made a protest to moscow today, a complaint that rises out of a border clash. Red soldiers made what the Persians call -- an "unprovoked attack".
