His decision - taken against the advice of top Lissic Klan officials - said Dubois. But essential, - if he were to maintain his exa sense of "loyalty and integrity". Dubois adding that "anyone who takes the fifth amendment - is either a Communist or has something to hide." In Hayneville, Alabama, today

A twelve man white jury took less than two hours to acquitt Collie LeRoy Wilkins of a charge that he killed Mrs. Viola Liuzzo, a white civil rights worker. A crowd of spectators in the Lowndes County W FenCourt House sent up a cheer The verdict of acquittal was read to the court. Wilkins was a member of the <del>Ku Kiwa</del> Klan. He had been tried once before on the murder charge and that time the jury was unable to agree on a verdict.

### FIRES

Some six hundred men battled a series of major brush fires today - in and around the city of San Diego. One of the blazes halted only a few hundred feet - from an eighty-seven-million-dollar nuclear power plant, Presently under construction - at the Camp Pendleton Marine Base.

The fires blamed in part - on a record-breaking heat wave, Aremperatures topping the hundred mark - for the second straight day. A desert wind with gusts up to seventy miles an hour - adding to the danger.

At last report - more than five thousand acres of land-blackened by the fires. More than twenty persons injured - more than twenty buildings destroyed.
