At the peace table in Paris - the pressure was on today William Porter for the U.S. - urged the Communist side to accept a negotiated peace; to do so now - said he - and not allow the opportunity "to pass you by."

As for Communist reaction - Porter later saying: "They seemed to be at a bit of a loss." Adding: "I had the feeling - they are a little bothered about international events." This was clearly a reference to President Nixon's forthcoming trips - to Peking and Moscow.

And then - the Communist calling a new conference of their own. Saying: If President Nixon wants to get out of the war - he must reply to their negotiation proposals made in Paris." Other than that - they added - the President's travel plans calling for no comment.

SAIGON FOLLOW PARIS

Nevertheless, the war continues to wind down -
at least, as far as U.S. troops are concerned. The U.S.
casualty list for the past week - as announced today in
Saigon - showing eight American combat deaths; the lowest
such figures - in six years.

WHITE HOUSE FOLLOW SAIGON

Meanwhile, a White House announcement - released simultaneously in Peking; disclosing that President Nixon's top foreign policy adviser - Henry Kissinger - will be leaving for the Red Chinese capital this Saturday; there to negotiate the final details - of the President's planned visit.

WASHINGTON

Elsewhere in Washington - the final session of a two-day, tumultuous meeting of the Democratic National Committee; ending with a warning to dissident Democrats - to shape up or ship out.

Democratic National Chairman Lawrence O'Brien - saying he will not give in to "intimidation or threats;" - therefore, he said - "persons unwilling to participate" - can "look elsewhere for a political home - fourth, fifth or sixth party notwithstanding." And he added: "Let that world go out from here now." So said Lawrence O'Brien.

PITTSBURGH

In the fifth game of the World Series - it was all Pittsburgh today. The Pirates' Nelson Briles - hurled a masterful two-hitter; and teammate Bob Robertson's homer in the second - was all the edge he needed. But the Pirates adding three more insurance runs - finally winning it, four-to-nothing; their third straight victory - after two opening losses.

Sixth game - set for Saturday in Baltimore; and now it's the Orioles - with "their" backs to the wall.

STOCKHOLM-NASHVILLE

**The winner of this year's Nobel Prize for medicine -
Dr. Earl Sutherland of Vanderbilt University; the discoverer
of a so-called "missing link" - in the biological control
mechanisms of the human body. Dr. Sutherland becoming the
sixth American so honored - in a period of six years.**

VATICAN

At that world synod of bishops - a special report
today from the Vatican's Commission on Justice and Peace;
charging that North America and Western Europe have enriched
themselves - by exploiting the poor and backward nations of
the world. The Commission adding that ^{They} said nations have a
right and a duty to defend themselves - with, ^{- it said -} quote,
"appropriate measures;" although it ^{did. i} was not spelled out -
just what these "measures" might be.

UNITED NATIONS

A long-planned Eighty Million-Dollar addition to United Nations' headquarters in New York - suddenly canceled today. U.N. Secretary General U Thant - explaining that the U.S. Congress has failed to come through with an expected Twenty-Million; or one-fourth - the total cost. Adding that "under the circumstances - it would appear the expansion plan is unlikely to be implemented."

ABILENE

Abilene, Kansas - a brief ceremony today rededicating the new, enlarged Eisenhower Museum. Those present - including Mrs. Mamie Doud Eisenhower; also, President Nixon's personal emissary / White House adviser Robert Finch; who laid a Presidential wreath - on the Eisenhower Tomb.

But the highlight of the service: The reading of a prayer that Ike himself composed - for his first inauguration; a prayer pledging that "our concern shall be for all the people - regardless of station, race or calling."

I am on board the Queen Elizabeth II, taking my wife for a quick trip to "The Continent", as travelers usually refer to our neighbor on the other side of the Atlantic. I've always been interested in the way people change names, often using a more casual or familiar term, like "The Continent", as though it was the only continent. Perhaps they do it because so many Americans originally came from there, or their ancestors did. When you go to the South Pole and after you arrive in New Zealand you find no one ever refers to it as the Antarctic. They simply say: "Oh, you are going down to The Ice?" British Tommies in World War One were always talking about going back to "Blighty", and so on. But ever since the coming of the era of getting around the world by air, we've done all of

our travel in airplanes. Not a single important ocean voyage. So, my wife said: "Let's do the Atlantic on a steamer and imagine we are young again." So, here we are on board what I presume is the most impressive ocean liner of them all, the Queen Elizabeth the Second. I wonder if she has a deep ~~throat~~ throated whistle, the same as the steamers on which we traveled those many years ago? At any rate, when you hear a blast, no matter what it sounds like, you'll know we are pulling away from the New York pier, on our way across "The Pond!"
