Well, I've talked to him twice in the past forty-eight and hours by shortwave over the weekend. In case you have not been following this dramatic adventure, Max Conrad, the sixty-fire year old airman to it who has twenty-eight or, twenty-nine grandchildren, is trying to be the first to fly around the world, solo, over both poles.

Over the weekend he phoned me from McMurdo, our largest Antarctic base, on the edge of the Ross Sea.
