MOSCOW

Russia and Red China -- at it again today -- hammer and tong.

In Moscow -- an article in the official Soviet

Communist party newspaper Pravda; charging that

Mao Tse-Tung and his followers -- had tried to start

a pro-Mao revolution in Russia, itself.

The plot backfiring -- said Pravda; to the point "of bringing Soviet-Chinese relations -- to a complete rupture."

The article proceeding to denounce Mao -his "personality cult" -- and his so-called "cultural
revolution," in the big terest terms it has yet used
to attack the Red leader. Pravda asserting that Mao
and his supporters are "sacrificing everything" -solely because of personal ambition.

PEKING FOLO MOSCOW

Foreign Minister, fanning the flames of hate.

Marshal Chen Yi, accusing Russia of "bloody suppression"—
in its treatment of Chinese students and diplomats
living in Moscow. This — said he — bringing
"relations between the two countries — almost to
a breakup."

Kong — telling of alleged secret talks in Mongolia.

Russian emmissaries supposedly discussing the

possibility — of Soviet aid to anti-Mao forces.

VIETNAM FOLLOW PEKING

Meanwhile the bloodiest fighting of Nineteen-SixtySeven -- was under way today in Vietnam. U.S. troops -clashing twice with the Viet Cong; first, in the Central
Highlands -- and later, near the coast; with tough Korean
troops beating off a Viet Cong sneak attack; in the process
-- killing nearly Twoo-Hundred-Fifty of the enemy.

In the air war -- Ho Chi Min's spokesmen were telling of American jets flying over Hanoi today; in a bombing attack on Red targets not far from the north Vietnamese capital.

This the Pentagon denies -- saying there were no targets today closer than Thirty-Five miles from anoi.

DRAFT FOLO VIETNAM

Here at home — a surprise announcement today from Defense Secretary Robert McNamara, Extending the draft to all men who enlisted in civilian reserve units — but since have failed to serve in them. The new rule expected to put in uniform about 30,000 men — who otherwise would have been draft-exempt.

The U.S. missile tracking ship <u>Sword Knot</u> -- barred today from landing in Durban, South Africa. After six days of waiting -- the ship ordered to proceed instead to the port of Mombassa, Kenya, where it will undergo repairs -- resulting from action off the coast of Vietnam.

Diversion of the <u>Sword Knot</u> -- apparently due to

South Africa's official policy of apartheid, and comes

on the heels of that recent controversy when the U.S.

aircraft carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt -- docked briefly

at Capetown.

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America's first Ambassador to the Soviet Union -- dead today in Paris. William C. Bullitt? -- a victim of leukemia; at the end of a long -- distinguished -- and often-controversial life.

Bill Bullitt's public career began in Ninteen-Ninteen
when he went to Moscow as a special emissary for then
President Woodrow Wilson. His talks with Lenin -- paving
the way for official recognition of Stalinist Russia -- some
Thirteen years later.

With Bullit eventually becoming -- one of the fiercest critics of the Soviet Union. He achieved his final flurry of excitement -- with recent publication of a book eh co-authored with Sigmund Freud. A book supposedly a psychoanlysis of President Wilson -- and not too flattering, to say the text least.

According to doctors -- William Bullitt kept alive in recent weeks - only by a desire to see his native Philadelphia one last time. A wish -- that could never be. He was 76.

policy. The President — for his part — quoted as

That was a tragic, spectacular accident today in Chicago -- the light plane groping through fog that enshrouded the windy city -- looking for a lake-front airport, Meigs Field, just a few blocks from Michigan Avenue, suddenly two skyscraper apartment buildings loomed up dead ahead.

The pilot -- trying desperately to fly between the two buildings -- his plane hit one at the Sixteenth floor -- bounced back against the other at the Fourteenth floor; and then plunged crazily into a vacant lot -- just across busy Sheridan road; sending wreckage showering down -- in the midst of rush-hour traffice.

The pilot and his passenger -- killed instantly.

But miraculously, no one else was hurt.

The second and final volume of a strange and controversial novel was published today in Moscow. Marking the first time in Soviet history -- that a Russian writer has ever dealt favorably with the theme of Christ.

The book is called -- "The Master and Marguerita."

It's one of the final works of the late Alexander Bulgakov

-- regarded the best of Russia's post-revolutionary

playwrights. However, the novel was withheld from publication

for nearly thirty years -- because of government censionship.

Now at last -- "The Master and Marguerita" -- which departs sharply -- from traditional accounts of the life of Christ; telling at one point -- of an argument he supposedly had with Pontius Pilate; ending with Christ predicting the ultimate disappearance of secular abhority and the ultimate triumph of virtue and justice.

Later -- after the Crucifixion -- Pontius Pilate
suffers such remorse -- that he orders the execution of Judas.
The moral--Warren--that absolute power -- corrupts absolutely.
