frantic kidnap search at Chelsea, Massachusetts. The Carlin baby has been found -- found dead in the home of the parents, in the basement. While the hunt for the missing child was increasing in intensity, Chelsea police officers searched the Carlin home -- and there they found the body of the six months' old baby in the drawer of a china closet in the basement. Against the china closet a bureau had been pushed, wedged against it.

and the twenty-three year old mother is quoted as saying -- that the child had been dead for four days, when she reported that some kidnaper had stolen him from a baby carriage. has found him double when she came home the father is a sailor who hurried home on

furlough after the kidnapping. He is said never to have seen the child -- only pictures.

The explanation in this strange story, this grussome has heax, has not yet been made clear -- the conclusion of an affair marked by widespread

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excitement throughout.

Archbishop Cushing of Boston offered his help to recover the missing child. A woman contributed her jewels.

One curious turn developed today -- with with an arrest. It concerned a ransom demand by telephone, a woman's voice requiring three thousand dollars for the return of the child. Later, another talkant telephone call, and the demand was reduced to five hundred dollars, and the father was told to go to Springfield, Massachusetts -- where, at an appointed place, the child would be returned to him. The father kept the rendezvous - but nobody appeared.

residence in the town, and there took into custody a fourteen year old girl promptly confessed that she had made telephone demands for ransom -- but she knew nothing about the missing child.

What led the police to this fourteen year old.

Sirl? They suspected her because twice in the past she

The Administration has run into two setbacks in Congress. The House of Representatives gave the White House a turn-down today on the subject of the full employment bill. Previously, the Seante had adopted a measure a good deal weaker than the reconversion ideas propounded by President Truman. And now the House has passed a bill still weaker than the Seante version.

Walso -- President Truman sustains a disappointment in his belief that Congress would pass a bill for fact-finding labor legislation by Christmad. The

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salaries -- boos the pay of the Legislators. The Senate voted -- no, turning down the pay raise by forty-five to Twenty-seven.

## PEARL HARBOR

The resignation of the legal staff of the

Pearl Harbor Committee is a culmination of a disagreement

all along. The legal staff, headed by William D.

Mitchell, has not approved of the line of questioning

adopted by Republican Members of the Committee.

In the statement of resignation today, the Republican Members are not specifically mentioned, but it is made clear that the legal staff thought the investigation should be limited to the reason why the Jap attack was successful, while the Republican Committee members insisted on going into broader aspects of the course of events that led to the war with Japan.

Time The Legal Staff declares that too much time has been taken, the inquiry dragging out too long. They say they can't spare that much time -- and so are stepping out.

At the same time, Chairman Semator Barkley intimates that he may withdraw from the Pearl Harbor Committee. He said today that he has his duties as Majority Leader in the Examtaxta Senate to consider, as well as the task of investigating Pearl Harbor.

The investigation of war criminals in Japan brings an American demand for evidence concerning melodramatic incidents that occurred before the war. The Tokyo Government has been given five days to produce documents relating to episodes -- that occurred in Nineteen Thirty-Two and 'Forty.

In Nineteen Thirty-Two occurred what is called -- "The young officers' revolt." I remember telling about it in the news that year -- how fanatical young Nationalists staged a sort of insurrection, with terrorism and assassination. A moderate government was in power in Japan then -- too moderate for the Militarists. The young officer fanatics murdered Admiral Viscount Saito, Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal; also, \*\* the finance minister. of the Military Inspector Congral.

The Perocious outbreak was put down, and fifteen rebel leaders were executed -- others committing hari-kari However, the moderate cabinet of Premier Okada resigned after the young Officers' revolt and the new Prime Minister was Hirota, whose arrest as a suspected war

criminal has been ordered by General MacArthur.

That's one episode to be investigated -- terind out what really happened. The other is an assassination attempt in Nineteen Forty, when rabid Nationalists tried to assassinate Foreign Minister Arita -- because he was opposed to the Japanese alliance with Nazi Germany.

The investigations are accompanied by news of more arrests -- five former Japanese prison camp commanders and guards being taken into custody at Tokyo today. They are accused of torturing and murdering American prisoners of war. They are defendants in the first war-crime-trial to be held in Japan.

## INDIANAPOLIS

At the Court Martial of the Captain of the last cruiser Indianapolis the Navy today completed its case. The final testimony against Charles McVay, charged with negligence in the sinking of the Indianapolis, was the introduction of records to show the ship had been warned. A message had been sent that enemy submarines had been spotted in waters the ship was traversing. That warning had been given the day before the Indianapolis was torpedoed by a Jap submarine. This bears out the contention that the Indianapolis should have been zigzagging, anti-submarine tactics, instead of steaming on a straight course -- as the cruiser was doing when sunk." But the Jap out-commander said zig zagging would have made no difference. The greatest crime of all times was disclosed today in figures -- a monster horror story revealed in the cold language of statistics. At the Nuremberg trial today, an American prosecutor brought forward the record of the Nazi extermination of the Jews, a record derived from written evidence left by the Nazis themselves.

A total of six million lives were taken. That figure is based on a statement made by the Jewish Section of the Gestapo. Four million Jews were killed in extermination camps, two million at other places.

Of the total, three million were Polish Jews.

This figure is based on a notebook compiled by one of the defendants in the Nuremberg trial, Hans Frank, who was Nazi Governor of Poland. In September of Nineteen Forty-One, Frank recorded that there were three million Jews in Poland. In January of Nineteen Forty-four, he noted in his diary that only one hundred thousand were left.

Frank made a record of a decision that one

million, two hundred thousand were to perish by hunger. In Nineteen Forty-Two he issued orders to prevent the Jews in Poland from buying meat, wheat, milk or eggs -- a death sentence of starvation.

The American Prosecutor today produced evidence that at one time the Nazi Government planned to send several million Jews to Madagascar, the French Colony off the Coast of Africa. Madagascar evidently was to be a part of the Nazi Empire. But they abandoned their plan of deportation, and went in an crgy of murder instead.

while this evidence of horror was being given, the news was issued that a batch of the worst Nazi criminals had been hanged -- The British carrying out the sentence of death against eleven perpetrators of horror at the Belsen atrocity camp. Chief of these, was Josef Kramer called the "Beast of Belsen." He was hanged simultaneously with the camp doctor, whose specialty it had been to pick out victims for the gas chambers. And, three women, were executed one Irma Grese, the blond assistant to the Beast of Belsen.

The Army Air Force is acquiring what is called -- Zhe office of Research and Development. This will be a department for technical progress. The head of the Office of Research and

During the recent war, General Lemay had charge of
something new and startling -- the B-29's. The
pulverizing campaign of the giant superfortresses against
Japan.

All of this is a thing most urgently called for, and I xxxxx can't illustrate any better than by going back to something told me by General Jimmy Doolittle, Commander of the devastating Eighth Air Force against the Nazis te was recalling the days after World War Number One when he was a young army

flyer. He served in the Mexican Border Patrol -- and that was one harum-scarum bunch.

"I don't think, " said Jimmy Doolittle, "There has ever been, before or since, such a high proportion of crashes in any outfit. Planes cracked up all the time, flyer on the Mexican border.

If a pilot doing some fool things wrecked his plane, he wasn't reprimanded," He wa more likely to get a pat on the back. The Commanding officers rather wanted the equipment to be smashed up. We had a mess of obsolete old D.H.'s, and needed new planes. The sooner we were rid of the ancient crates, 50," added Doolette, the sooner we would get some thing new. To if a pilot decided to risk his neck in some crazy stunt, nobody cared if he cracked up his plane. "

That madcap fantasy of old and obsolete junk is an eloquent background for the news of the establishment of an Army Air Force Office of Research and Development, the purpose of which is to keep American Air Power equipped with the latest -- the most modern possible at all time.

This is accompanied by a disclosure of a spectacular development during the latter part of the war in Europe. We are took told what was done about one type of target that was immune from bombing -- German submarine pens.

allied Air Power tried long and hard to knock out the bases of the Nazi U-Boats, which were raising such havor on the ocean. The U-Boats were kept in pens protected by forty feet of concrete. Bombs were showered down, but the most powerful blockbusters failed to shatter the massive concrete roofs of the nests of the submarine area.

The only way to get at them with a bomb would have been to toss a charge of high explosive sideways -- into the opening. But how could a plane hurl a bomb that way? It couldn't be done. -- But, something else was done. Planes loaded with high explosive were sent gliding into the submarine pens, and they crashed with devastating blasts.

The planes, were worn-out flying fortresses,

Lows taken into the air by a pilot and a co-pilot, who bailed out over England -- came down by parachute. And from then on the Fortresses for enormous bombs.

Mother ships flew along with them, and guided them by wireless. The radio control could be operated over a distance of twenty miles -- the usual distance was five miles. Staying that far away, the mother planes directed the flying fortresses for gliding flights into the submarine pens at Heligoland, where they crashed and blew up the powerfully protected lairs of the prowlers.

The word from General Patton's bedside is -excellent. Today the doctors at Heidelberg issued their
most optimistic bulletin since the most brilliant of
American Armored Force Commanders incurred broken
neck in an automobile crash. The prediction is that it
will be possible to fly the General back to the United
States from four to six weeks.

Today's medical bulletin states: "Patton is out of danger at the moment." And to this it adds:
"But the General is not out of danger of partial paralysis for the rest of his life." He still cannot move his arms and legs, though he has been able to attain some movement at the shoulders.

A spirit of irony hovered over a hospital bed at Little Rock, Arkansas, as a drama of human life came to a mocking end. A man died, after a street accident -- he had been run over by a poultry truck, a wagonload of chickens. He was Matt Kimes, the Oklahoma Desperado whom the police had been seeking far and wide as public-enemy-number-one of these post-war months.

Matt Kimes was the last of the Oklahoma badmen who terrorized the Middlewest and Southwest some
years ago. He began in Nineteen Twenty-four as a
burglar, after which he turned to bank robbery and
established a notorious record of larceny and gunfire.
Time and again he made lurid headlines with pistol
blazing robberies and escapes from Prison.

During a bank hit hold-up at Sallisaw, Oklahoma, he killed a deputy sheriff in a pistol duel. He was caught, convicted, and sentenced to life imprisonment -- then escaped: In Nineteen Twenty-Seven his gang tried a double job, the robbery of two banks at Beggs.

Oklahoma. This resulted in a wild and woolly gun battle down the streets of the town, the bandits shooting it out with the police and the Chief of Police was killed.

Again Matt Kimes was captured, convicted, and sent to prison for life. This time he served long years, and became a model convict. His conduct was so good that he was given permission to leave the prison so that he could collect signatures on a petition for clemency. He was given a prison furlough -- and then failed to return.

At Morton, Texas, a bank robbery occurred recently, the crooks getting away with the loot. And who should turn up as one of the bandits -- but Matt Kimes, the old Oklahoma badman. He had made use of his furlough from prison to go bank robbing again -- figuring in another desperate episode of crime and escape.

A great manhunt was staged over a wide area of Texas and Oklahoma, a search for the veteran robber who now was ranked as -- public enemy number one.

While the manhunt was on it in full cry,
