On Capitol Hill - a giant first step today toward the passing of strict new gun controls. With a Senate judiciary subcommittee approving by a vote of nine to nothing & President Johnson's proposed ban on the mail order said of rifles and shotguns.

Supporters of the bill - including Senator Hruska of Nebraska; heretofore, one of the chief senate foes - of legislation to ban mail order sales of any guns.

over Texas -- President Johnson voicing quick approval

of the vote. "I am delighted at the action" -- said he.

"Americans should not have to wait any longer for a

strict gun control law -- the time for action is now."

Elsewhere in Washington - the President's new commission on violence held its first working session today. Chairman Milton Eisenhower - later saying the commission will investigate three major areas of lawlessness: political assassination - criminal attacks on individuals - and mass disorders such as riots.

"We are today - a free, open and progressive society" - said Milton Eisenhower. Adding: "We shall remain so - by finding ways to achieve our goals without violence" by demonstrating "that liberty, progress and order - are not irreconcilable."

In the Middle East - for the first time in

a year -- fighting again in the Sinai. With an Egyptian

commando force - crossing the Suez Canal today.

Penetrating some twenty miles -- into Israeli-occupied

tank territory. Setting up an attack on the Israeli

positions - near the Sinai town of Romani.

According to Jerusalem though - the Egyptians were quickly routed by Israel troops. Indeed, five bodies later returned to Egypt - through the international Red Cross.

Surrender in Saigon. One hundred and twenty-one Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops - tossing in the towel today; after three days of bitter fighting - with South Vietnamese Marines. The group including only ten - who escaped the battle unscathed.

One of these - a fourteen year old boy; who explained that -- "all of my friends have been killed or wounded."

This is the largest mass surrender of the war - ending for now, at least, the current battle of Saigon. With an American officer saying: "They were damn smart to call it quits -- or they'd all be dead now."

In Paris - ninth round peace talks will be getting under way in a matter of hours, now. Diplomatic observers noting in advance - that Hanoi's recent military moves in South Vietnam seem to have backfired. With world opinion - swinging over to the United States. Perhaps to the point where North Vietnam will agree at last - to private talks that could prove more fruitful.

This - sheer speculation, of course, Hanoi, as yet, giving no sign -- of a desire to enter into meaningful discussions. Still-hope spring eternal.

At the United Nations - a blast today from

Secretary General U Thant, Accusing both the United

States and North Vietnam of escalating the war - since

the start of Paris talks. However, Thant particularly

condemning what he called - the Viet Cong's "barbarous

raids" on South Vietnamese cities.

At Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington the prognosis continues good today for former President
Eisenhower. Doctors reporting that Ike is making "very
encouraging progress" -- from his most recent heart
attack Saturday night. Adding that he's been sleeping well
-- and "there has been no recurrence of chest pain."
Under the circumstances - welcome news, indeed.

Maximum security again the order of the day - as James Earl Ray today made his second appearance in a London court. This - to hear a U S request for extradition. Magistrate Frank Milton immediately ordering Ray held without below bail - pending a hearing June twenty-seven. Ray's British attorney later indicating he will fight the case - all the way to the last appeals court in Britain.

France's "great strike of sixty-eight" 
all but ended today. With the return to work - of some

eighty-five thousand Renault employees. Leaving only

a handful of remaining strikers - where once there were

ten million.

Meanwhile, French President DeGaulle - is said to be supremely confident of winning Sunday's national election. So much so - that he's already drafting a series of sweeping economic and social reform bills. This a kind of French "new deal" - we are told; to be passed, hopefully, this summer - by the new French Parliament.

A so-called "petticoat revolution" at a Ford production plant in London - is tonight rapidly approaching and a national crisis.

In the beginning - eleven days ago - the tie-up involving less than two hundred women upholstery stitchers - demanding equal pay with men. Now, however, the snowball effect of the women's strike - idling some four thousand men workers. Costing the nation nearly two million a day - in exports alone. With a women's sympathy strike in a second Ford plant - threatening to idle an additional thirty-six thousand over the next two weeks.

Meantime, the lady strikers today rejecting a male "peace plan" - calling for a board of inquiry to study the wage z situation. Shop Steward Lillian O'Callaghan asserting: "We are not interested in committees being formed. - we want more money."
