Good evening everybody.

President Nixon proposed a reform of the electoral system. With the 1968 campaign still fresh in mind, Mr. Nixon is asking Congress to make electoral vote more closely reflect the popular vote, and permit election of a President by as little as forty percent of the electoral vote - instead of a majority, as required now. In case no candidate receives forty percent, there would be a run-off election between the two leading candidates...and whoever wins the runoff would become President.

Mr. Nixon says he is not wedded to this plan or any other specific plan - in effect, he leaves the details up to Congress, but he says the events of 1968 - when the candidacy of George Wallace prevented either Mr.

Nixon or Hubert Humphrey from winning a majority of the popular vote - constitute the clearest proof that the priority must be accorded to electoral college reform.

Another late-afternoon development at the White House the president has re-assumed responsibility for government
oil import policies. In the Johnson Administration they
were delegated to the Interior Department. Now the
President - in a memo to Interior Secretary Walter Hickel takes these responsibilities back again and orders a full
review of the entire subject. He says a wide range of
complex and highly important issues - affecting the nation's
oil import policies - must be dealt with in the near future.

#### WASHINGTON

From the Pentagon by way of Capitol Hill - word

today that Russia is now testing - a new, improved

anti-ballistic missile system. This according to Defense

Secretary Melvin Laird - in testimony before the Senate

Foreign Relations Committee. With the new equipment

further said to include - better radar devices than

the Soviets have ever had before.

The Secretary's remarks - by way of explaining a U.S. decision last year - to begin construction of our own anti-ballistic missile system. Melvin Laird going on to assure the committee - that a current review of that decision will be an objective one. But he made it obvious - he does not intend for the U.S. to stand idly by; while the Soviets and Red Chinese - continue to progress in the development of strategic weapons.

Secretary Laird asserting: "I personally lean toward going ahead with such a system." Adding that the only

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question in his own mind - as of now: Just what kind of system - it should be.

## WEST BERLIN

Defiance at West Berlin. The U.S. Air Force today ignoring a Communist protest. Flying in West
German President Heinrich Luebke - demonstrating once
again the Western right of free access to that divided
city. Luebke later joining in a memorial service - to
German atomic scientist Otto Hahn.

This, of course, a plus for our side - in preliminary skirmishing on that planned Berlin meeting of the West German Parliament. Although the East Germans themselves were also stirring things up today. And Moscow announces that the East German and Soviet troops will hold joint, large-scale maneuvers next month ...along the border with West Germany.

### SAIGON FOLLOW PARIS

In today's major combat action - American Marines and
North Vietnamese regulars - battling from ridge-to-ridge
high above the A Shau Valley.

On one peak - some forty enemy troops delaying their flight - attempting to save two big artillery pieces; when American guns - zeroed in on their position.

A U S. officer later observing: "They stayed - and they died."

Here in New York - the big news today is the largest mass transplant in medical history; with a single donor - a fifty-seven-year-old man - attempting to benefit six others. Doctors passing on his heart - his liver - his kidneys - with later plans to transplant his corneas as well. Giving four people the chance to live - and two the chance to see.

Names of the principals involved - as yet undisclosed.

At last report though - all the recipients were doing well.

Today's feat also marking the first time a heart was removed in one hospital - and transplanted in another.

The two institutions - a block a part.
