## CANBERRA

The ouster of Gough Whitlam as Prime Minister of Australia was followed almost immediately today by violent demonstrations in Melbourne, Sidney, Perth and Brisbane; with opposition leader Malcolm Fraser, the new Caretaker Prime Minister in Canberra - all but mobbed enroute to his swearing in ceremonies.

But once in office, Fraser quickly pushing through the budget bill - which Whitlam was unable to have passed.

The Australian government - thus caved from virtual bankruptcy. Fraser also announcing that new elections will be held - sometime around December Thirteen.

At a meeting of the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization in Rome - a vicious, almost senseless attack today on U.S. food policy. Libya's Mohammed Ali Tabu accusing the U.S. of attempting to feed the hungry millions -"with bullets and bombs" in an effort to "impose control and domination;" therefore, the U.S. should be expelled from the F.A.O. - on the grounds "no place should be given to colonial, imperialist, facist, and racial states." All of which ignores, of course, the fact that the U.s. is the biggest single contributor to the F.A.O. - and of food aid in general

A House sub-committee voted nine to five today to recommend that Commerce Secretary Rogers Morton be
cited for contempt, for refusing to supply the names of U.S.
firms - that have joined in boycott against Israel.

Both Houses today condemned the UN action in classing Zionism with racism. President Ford concurring in this.

The President in Charleston, West Virginia tonight in a speech will chide Congress for failing to produce energy legislation. Also saying so far as the National economy is concerned we are well on the way torecovery.
