Good Evening Everybody:

Today's elections in New Jersey and Virginia are being watched as a test of President Eisenhower, and
the popularity of his administration. Unlike New York
City, where it's a matter of local issues. With Mayor
Wagner, an odds-on favorite to defeat his Republican
opponent, the popular Bob Christenberry.

The New Jersey and Virginia contests for governor are regarded as the most important elections - since the Soviet Union beat us into outer space and since President Eisenhower sent troops into Little Rock.

In New Jersey, Republican Malcolm Forbes has been endorsed by the President. The G.O.P., hoping to unseat Governor Meyner. Which would offset the recent

Democratic victory in Wisconsin. If Meyner is reelected

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he may be a leading candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination in Nineteen Sixty.

In Virginia, the election centers around the question of segregation. How will Virginia react to the Little Rock crisis? - and the President's use of federal troops to enforce integration of the high school? That's the big question as Democrat Lindsay Almond clashes with Ted Dalton of the G.O.P. Almond favored, because he is backed by the powerful political machine of Senator Harry Byrd - and then Virginia usually goes Democratic.

Governor Knight's Washington declaration - was expected. All newsmen felt Knight intended to step out of the race - for Governor of California. Which he did today - after a White House conference with President Eisenhower.

hour. Mr. Eisenhower, urging him to run for the Senate in place of Knowland - who is going after the governorship.

When Knight a said he would - Mr. Eisenhower replied he was pleased to know - the G.O.P. will not have a bitter struggle in the coming primary.

Later in the day, Governor Knight metwith

Vice-President Nixon for forty minutes. The Vice-President,

also a Californian, noted that a Knight-Knowland ticket -
would be the strongest the Republicans could put up in

California. He thinks there's no stopping Knowland's progress

into the governorship - or Knight into the Senate. So there

won't be any big show-down between Knight and Knowland.-
They'll be running for different offices, come the primary.

Queen Elizabeth opened the new session of Parliament today - and it was a sombre event. The colorful trappings of monarchy were there, of course. Her Majesty and the Duke of Edinburgh arriving in the traditional coach. The Queen, entering Parliament amid a blaze of color and pageantry. She were the imperial crown, as she speke to her subjects.

It was not an optimistic speech. He Majesty Temaphed
on the progress of science - and no one could doubt that she was
referring to the achievements of Soviet science. She mentioned
the hopes and fears of mankind. Adding, that science should be
inspired by hope - and no retarded by fear. After which, she
gave a general statement of British policy in the coming session
the policy of the Macmillan government.

When her Majesty left, the Prime Minister spoke for himself. Macmillan, calling for cooperation in science. Saying, the free world must unite. - as Macmillan put it; -"I believe that never has the threat of Soviet Communism been so great."

At his news conference today, Secretary of State

Dulles gave most of his time to - science. Naturally, one of
the first questions thrown at him - was about the Soviet

satellite - and the status of our own satellite program

"Vanguard."

In reply, Secretary Dulles spoke of the great

arms achievement of the Russians. Repeating what we are

hearing over and over - that we must not under-estimate the

Soviet scientists. He wants an end to the idea that the

servants of a tyranny cannot keep up with the free world.

But he still feels we're not far behind. Maybe in some fields we are ahead. That "Vanguard" will go ahead on schedule. And, that we'll put up our own man-made moon into the sky.

What about guided missiles? He admits that the
Russians seem to have the jump on us - in developing
inter-continental ballistic missiles. But we may be ahead in
smaller missiles - which could be just as effective, if fired

from bases in Europe.

Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas announced today that the Senate Armed Services Sub-Committee will investigate our whole satellite and missile program. This after a seven-hour briefing -- by top experts in the Defense Department.

Soviet scientists say they can send a rocket to the moon - in ten hours - with the super-fuel used to launch

Sputnik Two. Which they a say they sent into outer space at the rate of five miles a second. So they could send one all the way to the moon, in a day.

Have they already launched a moon-rocket? They don't say. But astronomers are on the lookout. Thinking it could be.

Meanwhile, more information from Moscow - about

Sputnik Two. We are told the Russians developed a special electronic brain - to guide this one that is made of a special material to resist heat. And inside Sputnik Two - they put half a ton of scientific equipment. An astonishing scientific achievement.

The head of Unesco calls for international control of outer space. Dr. Luther Evans, telling a news conference - the United Nations should have control of satellites and exploration through the heavens. He pointed out that other countries, especially the United States - will soon be competing with the Russians. And he thinks the whole interplentary space business should be internationalized before there's any conflict over who has the right to what - out there in space. Maybe this is an apportunity for us to make a gesture!

More officers in the Red army - about to be down-graded. So indicated by the newspaper of the Soviet armed forces - the Red Star. In today's editorial it says that Zhukov isn't the only one who magnifies his own importance. That other officers have been guilty of the same thing - building up their own importance- and, supporting Zhukov against the Communist Party. The Red Star doesn't give any names, simply that there will be more candidates for down-grading. Many officers who admire Zhukov - and resent his fall.

AFRICA - TIMBUKTU

That most mysterious, most remote city in Africa, Timbuktu, has a religious, social and economic background that makes it one of the least likely places for Communism to take over. Nevertheless, within twenty-four hours after we arrived we discovered that the Reds are attempting to get a foothold even in Timbuktu. Young men of that French West African, southern Sahara city, receive frequent invitations to visit Moscow, and also Budapest. One prominent young man of Timbuktu returning recently from the big Youth Festival in Moscow, reported that he met Russians who knew more about his part of Africa than he did, and much more about Africa in general. They welcomed him with such sweeping hospitality, that he returned to Timbuktu completely sold on the U.S.S.R.

Although most of the people in this part of Africa do not have radios, there are hundreds who do. Every man who has any education at all - including the many who work in government offices - do have radios. They all listen

regularly to Radio Moscow, and to the Voice of the Arabs,

Nasser's radio in Cairo - both of which spend much of

their time attacking us. There's an important government

school, about a hundred miles southwest of here at Dioura,

midway between Timbuktu and Bamako. I was told that both

teachers and students receive much Red propaganda through

the mails. From us, nothing.

One of our surprises upon arriving at Timbuktu,
was to discover that an American Protestant mission is
trying to make a place for itself in this ancient Moslem
stronghold, once an important Islamic cultural center.
Only this week one of the native employees in the
Timbuktu post office said sneeringly to Missionary Frank
Marshall: "In your country you kill black people, and
then do nothing about it!"

Evidently, the Russians are using the technique once used so effectively by Hitler's Dr. Goebbels,

repeating lies, over and over, until far and wide they're accepted as the truth.

The Russians have been "going to town" on the Little Rock story - spreading it all over the globe. With what result in Timbuctu on the edge of the southern Sahara? French civil and military officials do not bring their families here. Not wanting them to be subjected to life in a city so far off the beaten path, mainly because of the lack of sanitation. For westerners there are not many places where life can be more hazardous than in Timbuktu. But the French do have a school for children of natives who are government employees, and of some of the Sonrai, Moorish, and Tr Tuareg merchants and nobles. Only two whites, eight year old David and six year old Sandra Marshall, from the American Baptist mission. These two children were recently stoned - although not injured, on their way to and from school. Their African schoolmates shouting: -

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"We do this to you, because you are mistreating our people!"

In my next report from Timbuktu, I will tell you something less grim about this far off romantic city.

PARIS

Felix Gaillard tonight won approval as Frances'
24th postwar Premier.

The victory came on Gaillards' thirty-eighth birthday and giving him the distinction of being the youngest Premier in French Republican history.
