WHITE HOUSE

The White House - President Nixon called a surprise press conference today; as you probably know by now - his first in more than four months. The President confirming an earlier report - that Henry Kissinger will journey to Hanoi next week. Purpose - said he - to discuss the subject of post war aid. The President adding that the himself - will confer later on with South Vietnam's President Thieu.

Beyond that, the President also serving notice that he begins his second term - in full fighting trim. At one point, telling the news men present: "We have achieved a peace with honor." Adding: "I know it gags some of you to write that phrase - but it is true." The President further accusing militant anit-war spokesmen of poicing the loudest criticism of the peace agreement; wondering aloud - "if they really want the wounds healed."

The President going on to say: "If the agreement is kept - there is no question that we will have a peace; not only in Vietnam - but in Indochina - for a very long period of time."

The President again assuming an adversary role - in discussing possible amnesty for deserters and draft dodgers. "I have sympathy" - said he - "for any individual who makes a mistake. We all make mistakes; but certainly - we have to pay a price for our mistakes; and that price is a criminal penalty for disobeying" - and not "a junket in the peace corps".

And then - perhaps warming to his subject the President saying: "The war had very little support among the better people in the media, intellectual circles and some members of congress; but it did have the support - of a wide majority of Americans." These - said he - including many Americans who abid a high price; some with their years." lives - some in prisoner of war camps for two or three

And later on the President accusing some of his chief critics in the press and in Congress - of "flip-flopping on the issue of "executive privilege." "I do not want to abuse executive privilege - we are not going to use it as a shield" - he continued. But where necessary - said he - it would continue to be invoked.

In response to subsequent questions - the President also discussed a broad range of subjects both foreign and domestic.

On his decision in certain cases not to spend funds already appropriated by Congress - the President saying he was following in the footsteps of three eminent Democrats, Jefferson, Jackson, and Truman. "It would be pleasant to have a sharing of the responsibility with Congress" - said he; "but if you're going to share responsibility - you have to be responsible."

On the shooting of Senator Stennis - who remains in serious condition: "a senseless act" - said the President. WHITE HOUSE - 4

Adding that the Senator from Mississippi had been indispensable - in helping to achieve peace in Vietnam. He also said that he had asked Attorney General Richard Klinedieant - to "give us a formula; one that can get through Congress - to keep guns out of the hands of criminals - but not impinge on those who have a legitimate right to have a gun."

About the Watergate bugging conviction? He was not asked.

WASHINGTON

Some seven weeks ago you may recall - a government notice of complaint was filed with the giant Xerox company. The Federal Trade Commission accusing the firm - of monopolizing the one-point-seven-billion dollar office copying machine business; also, urging Xerox to agree to a so-called consent procedure - to cease and desist. Except that negotiations aimed at achieving an out of court settlement apparently getting nowhere.

At any rate - the FTC today dropped the other shoe; filing a formal complaint - and assigning the case to one of its law judges; a case that will now probably drag on - for years and years. VIENNA

Today at Vienna - the start of "exploratory East-West talks - on the possibility of mutual troop cutbacks in Central Europe. Right at the outset - a note of confusion. The Soviets apparently pressing for equal troop reductions - while the U.S. seeking "balanced reductions."

Jonathon Dean, for the U.S. stressing, however this is "only the beginning." "We understand that it will be a complicated and difficult affair."- he continued - "but we are going to do our best for a constructive outcome."

BELFAST

In Northern Ireland - Belfast - the bodies of two Roman Catholic teen-agers were found today; each shot through the head a single time - execution style. Police saying the two murders could have been "Protestant Catholic vengeance killings - or they could be punishments by the IRA. In either case - the death toll in the latest flareup in northern Ireland now five in less than two days.

REYKJAVIK

From Premier Olafur Johanesson of Iceland - a public pledge today to rebuild the town of Vestmanneyjar; and do it - "as soon as possible;" to permit the return of an estimated five thousand of its former inhabitants who are now homeless refugees.

Even as he spoke though - Helgafjell volcano was continuing its eruption for an eighth straight day; spewing forth additional streams of lava - and addittonal vast clouds of volcanic ash; making nearby Vestmanneyjar and the entire island - a virtual no-man's land.

The volcanologists there are saying - it may be weeks or months - or years - before the eruptions cease. Perhaps years before the island will again be habitable.

SUNGEI PAGANI

From the Sungei Patani in Malaysia - the story of one Abdul Gani - age twenty-three - who took a few friends fishing - and ended up in jail. Explanation - as follows: Abdul Gani choosing as his "fishing hole" a branch of the Sungei Pagani Malayan bank. While his friends diverted a cashier's attention - casting his line over a partition - into the till; using as his fishing rod - a transistor radio with a long antenna; actually hooking a bundle of cash - when the cashier finally spotted him and sounded the alarm. In the end - Abdul Gani proving "the big one" who didn't get away.

LAKE PLACID

In the search for a suitable site for the Nineteen seventy six winter olympics - exit Salt Lake City re-enter Lake Placid, New York. The latter today submitting a new bid - to the U.S. Olympic Committee; the same as before - a bid predicated on the receipt of "sufficient state and Federal funds for proper financing."
