On the Vietnam war front - a temporary lull today;
with the Allies, at least, attempting to observe a Saigonproclaimed ceasefire - in deference to. Buddha's birthday.

However, the Communist side noting that this is also the
birth date - of the late Ho Chi Mink. Accordingly, Hanoi calling for stepped-up attacks - Buddha or no.

However, the Florida White House stressed that there has been - "no change in our activities in Laos;" adding that there are at present - no U.S. ground forces in Laos. The President himself later flying back to Washington - where he will hold a Cabinet meeting tomorrow morning; his first - in nearly three weeks.

In the current issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association - a discussion today of a newlyrecognized medical disorder; one that's said to have reached epidemic proportions - namely, homosexuality.
