A dispatch from Korea gives a disclosure of a recent exploit of war performed by thirty-eight

American G I's -- in a daring raid that cut behind the Communist line. The feat of arms was organized by Lieutenant Nicholas Shepard of Jersey City, New Jersey, who spent a whole week studying the terrain, and mapping out each move, in the daring maneuver: Then the G I's me operated according to plan; and here's what happened.

In the darkness before dawn, they made their way more than a mile through a heavily wooded valley, after which they are then stole along a rocky, razor-back ridge. This led them to the rear of a powerful enemy position, where the Korean Reds had about forty bunkers, bristling with guns. These fortifications, on high ground, would have been almost impossible to storm by frontal attack. But there were the thirty-eight G I's sagazing at the back door of the Red fortress - as the dawn broke.

Which started the battle by hurling a shower of hand-

grenades into Red bunkers. Astonished Communists came swarming out in amazement - never expecting an attack from the rear. They were cut down by the Number Two team- which consisted of sharpshooting riflemen.

A Communist bugle sounded - and, from other positions in the neighborhood, Red reinforcements came pouring. The G I's were ready for that. At a dominating point they had stationed a machine gun team - which swept enemy reinforcements with ahail of bullets.

But, by now, the whole Red front was aroused, and the party of G I's could never have got out - except for one other factor, carefully prepared by the Lieutenant from Jersey City. From the American lines came a storm of artillery and mortar fire, carefully plotted to coordinate with moves of the raiders. The shellfire covered their getaway, and back they came along the ridge and through the valley.

The whole thing- planned so Carefully and executed so precisely, not a single G I was lost.

A fanatical secret organization called "defenders of Islam," distributed pamphlets today throughout the Suez Canal zone - proclaiming terrorism against Egyptians who work for the British. They are threatened with - "horse whipping and brands burned in their faces." Which menace is intended to enforce the boycott Egyptians have declared against the British at Suez - who must rely, to a large degree, on Ex Egyptian workers.

Moreover, today tex the Minister of the Interior at Cairo gave a warning that - Egypt is threatened with revolution. He blamed this on British action, in cutting off oil supplies -- stopping fuel for sities like Cairo.

The Canal Zone was quiet today, guarded he on every side by British guns.

Rioting has broken out in French Morocco.

The trouble began today when a crowd of nationalists began demonstrating in Casablanca. They were broke into violence, and were fired on by troops - one rioter killed. That invited more mobs, and at last reports the French authorities were rushing reinforcements into Casablanca. This is the latest incident in the unrest and violence that sweeps the Moslem world.

In Teheran today, the Shah was warned that the Communists have become a "critical threat". This notice was given by the head of the Iranian Federal Police, who called on the monarch in person, and stated that the Tudeh, the outlawed Communist party, is expanding rapidly. So he asked for greater authority to fight the Reds.

The famous address is, of course, Number Ten Downing

Street, historic residence of the Prime Minister.

Number Eleven is next door, and the word about the new tenant there suggests the likelihood of a dramatic exploit by the new Prime Minister, Winston Churchill.

The theme is - atomic.

Today, Churchill took the British atomic program out of the control of the Ministry of supply and turned it over to his top adviser in scientific affairs - Lord Cherwell, a number one advocate of atomic development.

As leader of the opposition, Churchill Essit
assailed the Labor government for atomic failure not having produced a single a-bomb. Lord Cherwell,
last summer, told the House of Commons: "Failure in the
Atomic Energy field will stamp us as a second class
nation. Indeed" he went on, "unless we also possess
atomic weapons, we shall be in the position of savages

armed with boomerangs and bows and arrows, confronting armies using machine guns."

So now Lord Cherwell takes over British
atomic development - and this is accompanied by word
that he is moving into Number Eleven Downing Street,
next to Churchill. Which is like a graphic bit of
symbolism -- atomic headquarters right next door.

Today's London dispatch states the belief that Churchill intends to develop at least one bomb, and stage an atomic explosion at a testing ground. This, Churchill thinks would have a great impact on international affairs - showing the world that Britain has the bomb, In any case, it would be a sensational Churchillian gesture, typical of that master of the dramatic.
