In the Middle East - a new assessment of Arab military strength. Israeli Defense Minister Shimon Peres - saying the Egyptians are now capable of launching a massive attack across the Suez Canal; could do it - over night. Also, that Syria has just received from the Soviet Union - more than three hundred new war planes and more than a thousand new tanks.

And, says Jordan's King Hussein: "The indications are that the Israelis either expect, or might be thinking of a starting - a new military operation in the near future." King Hussein adding that "the prospects of war - are very real." President Ford today requested a written explanation from U.S. Steel - on why it's raising its prices as much as eleven percent. White House Spokesman Ron Nessen saying the President "is concerned and very disappointed" at the steel price hike; especially so - in that it runs counter to his present anti-inflation campaign.

The President also accepted with deepest regret the resignation of Budget Director Roy Ash; whose successor is expected to be Housing and Urban Development Secretary James Lynn.

Martian admitting at one point he had withheld certain information from fellow defendant Kenneth Parkinson. Denying, however, any criminal wrong doing. Adding that he still believes to this day there was no **Hermi** watergate culpability - either by the Nixon campaign commisses committee or its then chairman, John Mitchell. MAUNA LOA
