Good evening everybody. For a total of one hundred and ten times today, Sergeant Major William Wooldridge and three old Army buddies invoked the fifth amendment - declining, on grounds of possible self-incrimination, to testify before the Senate subcommittee investigating alleged graft and corruption in the Army. Their action brought to an end three weeks of hearings on charges that they - and others - took part in a vast operation of kickbacks, embezzlement and gambling skim-offs at enlisted mensa clubs. Republican Senator Charles Percy of Illinois said "These criminal actions that have been charged will have to be tried in court." Percy called Sergeant Major Wooldridge a Dr. Jeckyl and Mr. Hyde

- a man who brought discredit on the uniform he wears. And the Army stripped Wooldridge of his position as a Command Sergeant Major. Now he's justanordinary Sergeant Majorand still, perhaps, in trouble.
Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge had sharp words at
todays session of the Paris peace talks.

Refusing even to acknowledge an enemy contention that last week's Vietnam Moratorium was the true voice of the American people.

Instead, Lodge telling the Communists: "I have sat here all day - listening to the statement which you on the other side have made. And I am constrained to say" - he went on "that you have done nothing but repeat your demands for unilateral actions on our part" - you have done nothing but "engage in genuine negations." "Under these circumstances" he added - "I see no point" in prolonging the session.
In Saigon - another weekly casualty report. With
the number of U.S. battle deaths - set at seventy-eight;
marking the fourth straight week - that American losses have ended up less than a hundred. Perhaps equally significant South Vietnamese and Vet Cong losses were also way down.

All of which reflects that continued lull in the fighting.

MIDDLE EAST
In the Middle East - Arab versus Arab. Armed
guerillas from Syria - crossing into Lebanon at four points; attacking Lebanese border outposts - penetrating as much as two miles - before they were finally driven back by tanks and border reinforcements.

When they fled though - the guerillas took with them more than twenty captives. According to sources in Beirut these to be held as hostages; now, reportedly released. From Cairo - the militant Palestine Liberation Organization warning

- the plans "to make any move necessary to protect itself;"
in Lebanon - and anywhere else in the Middle East.
