

PARIS

Wed. June 12 - '68.

In Paris - the day grows short - the hour ~~is~~ late. U.S. Ambassador Averell Harriman - delivering a stern warning today to North Vietnam, <sup>,</sup>  
~~A~~ warning that continued Communist terror attacks on Saigon - could seriously jeopardize the Paris discussions. This during <sup>the</sup> eighth round <sup>of</sup> peace talks aimed, hopefully, at ending the war in Vietnam.

Harriman's remarks - containing no mention of possible retaliation. However, a U.S. source later saying: "What we are threatening - goes without saying."

6/2 Observers taking this to mean an imminent end to the U S partial bombing halt - unless Hanoi agrees at last to some reciprocal de-escalation.

Next go-round -- a week from today.

WASHINGTON

Senator McCarthy marches on. In Washington -- the Senator saying today -- he will carry on as a candidate for President; still hopeful of winning the ~~Democratic~~ nomination -- over Vice President Hubert Humphrey.

McCarthy adding, however, that his campaign will be "somewhat more restrained" -- in the aftermath of Senator Kennedy's assassination. Perhaps more personal," too -- said he.

LOS ANGELES FOLLOW WASHINGTON

~~Reverse side~~ -- ~~f~~rom Los Angeles -- site of the Kennedy assassination; where Governor Rockefeller of New York -- put in a strenuous day of campaigning ~~today~~; including a visit to the Watts District -- also a major foreign policy speech at Town Hall. The Governor calling for an end to U.S. policy -- attempting to isolate Communist China.

Earlier, Rockefeller ads appearing today -- in a total of forty newspapers in thirty-five major U.S. cities. ~~The~~ Full-page ads entitled: "Why I run." With the Governor going on to say -- the nation "needs leading, healing, uniting." As he did last night on national television -- Rockefeller thus linking himself again with the goals of the late Senator Kennedy.

UNITED NATIONS

*At the United Nations -- a rush toward adjournment today. With the General Assembly approving overwhelmingly -- a two-pronged resolution dealing with the territory of South West Africa.*

*One -- the territory renamed "Namibia". Two -- the U.N. Security Council urged to take immediate measures -- to win independence for the territory; also, to "ensure the immediate removal -- of the South African presence" there.*

*Only two nations voting against the resolution -- South Africa and Portugal. There were, however, eighteen abstentions -- including ~~that of~~ the U. S.*



ADD UNITED NATIONS

*Later, President Johnson paying a surprise call - at U N headquarters. Hailing the world body - for its just completed approval of that treaty to ban the spread of nuclear weapons. Pledging "on behalf of the United States - to make this the first step toward ending the peril of nuclear war."*

LONDON

*London -- the battle begins. U. S. Embassy officials taking the first legal step today -- to secure the extradition of James Earl Ray; delivering a file of pertinent documents -- to the British Foreign Office.*

*This -- an attempt to satisfy British law; by showing that there is a prima facie case against Ray -- in the murder of Martin Luther King.*

*Once the Foreign Office is satisfied -- the matter will then move on through channels. Ending up eventually with the British Home Office -- which bears ultimate responsibility in the case.*

ATLANTA

*Those four*  
~~cop out at Atlanta. Four desperate~~ convicts -  
today end <sup>ed their</sup> ~~ing a~~ twenty-seven hour siege at the Atlanta  
Federal Penitentiary. Turning loose some twenty  
hostages -- tossing their weapons out a window -  
finally surrendering ~~to~~ peacefully; after publication  
of their grievances, as promised -- in a local newspaper.  
Said grievances consisting mainly of complaints about  
food - parole officers - and so-called prisoner "goon  
squads."

Less than three hours later - police arresting  
a girl friend of one of the ~~men~~ convicts. Arlene Granito  
of Newark, New Jersey - accused of supplying the men  
with two pistols, a hundred rounds of ammunition, and  
four hacksaw ~~is~~ blades, ~~The whereabouts~~ for their  
mini-riot.

EVERGLADES

As recently as six weeks ago -- the Florida  
everglades were in the midst of <sup>a most unusual</sup> ~~a terrible~~ drought. Water  
levels -- dropping to a scant eight inches in some places.  
Threatening to wreak havoc -- among the everglades wildlife  
population.

Then came May -- and rain without end. Now June --  
and more of the same. Record precipitation -- ~~amounting to~~  
nearly thirty inches. Raising water levels in the everglades  
-- well above the three-foot level. With no let-up in sight --  
according to the Miami weather bureau.

~~In other words -- a complete turn around,~~ <sup>Now</sup> Wildlife  
officials fearing ~~today~~ for the lives of hundreds of young deer  
-- scarcely able to keep their heads above <sup>the</sup> water, ~~as it is~~.



AGE FOLLOW LABOR

~~In another item from the Labor Department -- public~~  
~~notice of~~ a new Federal law ~~that~~ takes effect today, ~~A~~ law  
prohibiting job discrimination against men and women --  
aged forty to sixty-five -- solely on the grounds <sup>that</sup> they're too  
old.

The very idea -- ridiculous on the face of it. ~~However,~~  
Labor officials <sup>re</sup>noting that the over-forty age group -- accounts  
for nearly a third of total U. S. unemployment -- and nearly  
50 1/2 half of all long-term unemployment. Many firms refusing to  
hire older workers -- because of the cost of retirement,  
insurance and other benefit plans.

Now, however, the government <sup>is</sup> out to prove that life  
really does begin at forty -- or fifty -- or sixty and beyond;  
depending solely -- on the individual.

THE HAGUE

For Queen Juliana of the Netherlands - who  
is already said to be one of the richest women in the  
world - another proposed pay increase today at the Hague.  
The Dutch Cabinet - introducing a bill in parliament,  
seeking to increase Juliana's annual salary - from  
seven hundred thousand to <sup>a million three hundred thousand,</sup> ~~one point three million,~~ Which  
figures out roughly to a hundred and seventy bucks an  
hour -- twenty-four hours a day - three-hundred and  
sixty-five days a year. <sup>Warren, How's that?</sup> ~~But, of course - no overtime.~~

KEY WEST

From Key West, Florida - the sad story of one William Henry Nelson; who defected to Cuba in Nineteen Sixty-three -- claiming that America "never did ~~do~~ anything for me" -- <sup>Those were</sup> ~~to use~~ his own words.

This same William Henry Nelson - floating back home today on an inner-tube raft. Telling U S authorities: "Cuba didn't do anything for me either."

And the echo answers back: "Ask not what your country can do for you, Mr. Nelson- ask what you can do for your country."
