GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

Britain proposes -August Twelfth for the meeting of the chiefs of state. Britain repeating - that the summit conferences must be held as part of a session of the security council of the United Nations. Where?

Either New York or Geneva - it hardly matters. So says

British Prime Minister MacMillan in a letter to Soviet

Premier Khrushchev, today. MacMillan - reading the letter in the House of Commons where one passage - drew a laugh.

Writing to Khrushchev, MacMillan states - he hopes the Soviet Premier will attend.

The M P's reared. Imagine Nikita - staying away!

That would be like a ham actor refusing to join the others at the center of the stage.

The Prime Minister was asked - did he think
President Lisenhower would attend. For example, if the

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conference were held in Geneva. MacMillan replied he thought President Eisenhower would be there, either in Geneva or New York.

Word in Washington is that the American reply to

Khrushchev may not be sent until tomorrow. But President

Eisenhower will say much the same thing that Prime Minister

MacMillan said today.

So that would seem to be that. Oh no - wait a minute.

today. In which he repeated his objections to New York - as the summit. He prefers a top level conference - to be held somewhere in Europe. DeGaulle also insisting - that it should not be held in conjunction with a security council meeting. He's against that - still, today, in Paris, ambassadors of the other Nato countries argued in vain - urging DeGaulle to line/with his British and

American allies. Mais non - General DeGaulle doesn't change his mind. He thinks a meeting of the chiefs of state at a security council session - in New York - would result in what today's dispatches from Paris call - "A propaganda free-for-all." The general may have something.

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SURPRISE ATTACK

The United States made a proposal to Soviet sussia today - for still another kind of conference.

Russian and American scientists have been neeting in Geneva - discussing technical ways of detecting atomic explosions. So that any testing ban - could be enforced. They've been making progress - and, now, Washington proposes that a similar meeting of technicians be held in Geneva, sometime in October. To consider means of preventing - surprise atomic attacks.

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In Beirut this morning heavy forces of soldiers took positions around the parliament building. Tanks and
artillery - placed at points which dominated the
approaches. Then, members of Parliament began to arrive
- coming to elect a new president.

Premier Sami Sohl - not among them. Yesterday, we heard how he declared - that he and his adherents would boycott the election. Sami Sohl, still outraged by the savage attempt, made by the rebels, to assessinate him. He'd have nothing to do with the business of choosing a president who'd be acceptable to both sides, the government party and the rebels.

He was particularly angry with the compromise candidate - General Faud Chehad, Commander of the Lebanese army. Because the general following the assassignation attempt - had not launched a full scale drive to chase insurgent forces out of Beirut.

A couple of other Cabinet iminsters, backing

Premier Sami Sohl, didn't put in an appearance, either.

But that didn't check the proceedings. There was a quorum,

present, and the Lebanon legislators went on to take a maximus.

The result - the election of General Faud Chehab, who goes in with a Parliamentary landslide. Forty-eight - to seven. Faud Chehab - the new President of Lebanon.

The importance being - that he was backed by both factions. The government - and the opposition. Rebel chieftians - declaring in his favor.

When the result of the election was announced by radio, there was an outbreak - of shooting. Guns - roaring all over the place. But that was nothing alarming, - a sign of celebration. When Arabs are jubilant about something p they fire their guns. The pandemonium of shooting, today - accompanied by rousing cheers.

the population is at an end.

Crowds favoring the government - shouting heir approval. Same thing for the rebel forces - holding a section of Lebanon - they were cheering too.

A triumph, indeed - for new President, Faud Chehab.

Also - a striking victory for American diplomat Mobert

Murphy. sent by President Sisenhower to Lebanon - to see

if a settlement between the government and the rebels

could be made. Murphy - working day and night for a

compromise. Urging both sides - to agree on Faud Chehab.

Today, by the way, Robert Murphy was not in Beirut

- not there to witness the successful outcome of his
endeavors. Yesterday, he flew to Amman, capital of Jordan
The situation there - described as tense. Murphy conferring with King Hussein on the precarious conditions in

Jordan. Then, today he went on to another destination;

Israel - for consultation with Israeli leaders. A busy
man - is Mobert Murphy.

So, now, in Lebanon - the rebellion is at an end.

Or at least - in abeyance. All quiet in Beirut - for the first time in weeks. The leaders of the rebels have declared a truce - although keeping their forces in positions they've been holding.

Reports in Seirut are - that the American military force of ten thousand men - will now be withdrawn from Lebanon. They say - that was agreed on. But - how soon? This question brings one discordant note in the news.

Insurgent leader Saeb Salem, declaring - the rebels won't quit until the American soldiers leave Bebanon.

What has washington to say? There the word is
that no plans are being made to take out the American
forces. Officials declaring - that the troops won't be
withdrawn until it's certain, for sure, that there will be
no outside interference in Lebanese affairs. No

Meanwhile, today brings a report from the U N
observers in Lebanon stating - that guns and ammunition

interference - from Masser's United Arab Republic.

have been brought from Syria to help the rebels. But in small quantities. No sign of Syrian men - crossing
the border.

Which might encourage the belief - that the Americans will be out of Lebanon by the time a summit conference is held.

SOCIAL SECURITY

The House of Representatives today, gave

overwhelming approval - to a bill to increase social

security benefits. Eleven million eight hundred thousand

persons to get a hike of seven percent. The measure,

likewise, would raise social security taxes - paid by

wage earners and employers.

The bill now gos to the Senate.
