

CAMP DAVID

Tues, Oct. 30 - 73.

At Camp David - far from the Washington turmoil -
President Nixon ^{today} was attempting ~~today~~ to work a near
miracle. The President scheduling a meeting tonight -
with Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and Soviet
Ambassador Dobrynin; ^{then} another meeting tomorrow & with
a personal emissary from Egypt's President Sadat; and
still another meeting Thursday - with Israeli Prime
Minister Golda Meir who is flying to Washington.

The White House saying: "These meetings are
all part of the President's efforts - to bring about [&] lasting
peace in the mid-East."

MID EAST FOLLOW CAMP DAVID

Meanwhile, Egyptian and Israeli officers were meeting face to face ~~today~~ for the fourth time in three days; attempting to work out a compromise - on the ~~zaphonix~~ explosive prisoner of war issue.

Tel Aviv later telling of an apparent agreement -- for an immediate exchange of wounded prisoners. Cairo insisting, however, there would be no exchange of prisoners - pending Israeli withdrawal to the original cease-fire line of last Monday. And there, at last report - the matter still stands.

SENATE

~~In~~ The New York Times ^{today carried} a charge ~~today~~ that President Nixon ~~had~~ personally intervened in behalf of I T T -- in a federal anti-trust case; a charge - promptly denied by the White House; which also called it the result of "an inexcusable breach of confidence - on the part of the staff" of former special Watergate Prosecutor Archibald Cox.

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This leading ~~was~~ to a later hassle - when Cox resumed his testimony before the Senate Judiciary Committee. Cox admitting that it may have been he who first leaked the ~~so~~ story in conversations with Senator Kennedy of Massachusetts and Senator Hart of Michigan. Said Cox: "There have been times when I spoke more freely than I intended to - with friends." Cox adding: "It was an error of carelessness and inexcusable - but not something I did deliberately."

Cox's admission - coming under questioning by

Senate Minority Leader Hugh Scott; who later blamed continuing news leaks -- on the President's quote

"unlisted enemies." ^{Sen.} Said Scott: "We have new innuendos each day - followed by new ~~inferences~~ inferences tomorrow - followed by hear-say the day after."

And he added: "This is an effort to stampede the judgment of the American people" ^{— and} _^ done with "a good deal of malice."

WHITE HOUSE FOLLOW SENATE

~~And~~ Later ~~on~~ the White House ^{came} ~~also chipping~~
in with ~~another~~ comment, ~~of its own~~. Deputy Press
Secretary ~~Gerold Warr~~ Warren saying: "We find ^{it} no
virtue that an attorney = a lawyer who was to have been
independent in his pursuit of Watergate matters -
should have given this information to two ^{(outspoken} ~~whistle~~
critics of the ^{Nixon} administration."

Warren going on to say: "We find this
inexcusable." Adding: "It is characteristic ^{we} feel
-- of the actions of the Special Prosecutor in recent
months."

More on news leaks from David Eisenhower -
in an interview today on TV ^{Young} The President's son-in-law
noting that leaks have frequently been timed - "either

^{David}~~Young~~ Eisenhower also saying the President's
criticism of the broadcast media - concerned mainly
its "selection of news." "This is the power of the
networks" - said he -- "to control the presentation of
news." On some occasions - he continued - the
"irresponsibility" of the news media -- is "matched
by the irresponsibility of the people they quote."

This ~~by means of~~ ^{via} a new six lane suspension bridge - more than half a mile long; ~~the~~ biggest ever in Europe or Asia; - ~~and~~ the fourth largest in ~~of~~ the world.

The Bosphorus bridge personally dedicated by Turkish President Fahri Koruturk - as part of modern Turkey's fiftieth anniversary ~~celebration~~ celebration.

The ceremony also drawing about a million ^{spectators} ~~specta~~ many of whom walked across and then back again; ~~the~~ first ever to accomplish such a feat [^] since the

construction of a ~~short~~ ^{long} pontoon bridge by Darius-the-

First of Persia. Darius ^{as you may recall} then launching ~~a~~ ~~part~~ an

[^] unsuccessful campaign against the Greeks, - ~~the~~ but that's another story.

During my visit to Acapulco, for the World Travel Congress, we were ~~at~~ talking with Neil Armstrong about his historic "first step." "Do you think," I asked, "there'll one day be a village on the Moon where scientists will reside?"

"I sure do," he replied. He said it will resemble the one we now have at the South Pole under the ice. Much of the ~~year~~ year Antarctic temperatures are so low - minus seventy, minus ninety, minus ~~one~~ one hundred twenty, and so on - that it's impossible to survive except under the ice surface. Temperatures are so low that for many months supply planes can't even land there. But down in the ice, our Deep Freeze people are ~~com~~ comfortable. Neil Armstrong ~~says~~ says much the same will be true on the Moon where there's no atmosphere.

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I also put another question to him: "At my age how about my going up to the Moon?" He said he saw no reason ~~why~~ why not. So the next time I'm in Washington

or Houston, I'll talk this over with our space people and see if it can be arranged! If I do go I hope that witty British actor Robert Morley will go along to entertain us.

"When presented with his Hall of Fame trophy Neil Armstrong ~~so~~ said he was sure the World Travel Congress was giving it to him for opening up a new route, for travellers! Bill, are you ready to fly to the Moon?"
