Committee voted an inquiry into those church trials behind the Iron Curtain. The Steering Committee of the U N put an okay on a resolution to investigate the trial of Cardinal Mindszenty in Hungary and the condemnation of the thirteen Protestant pastors in Bulgaria. This on the ground that two those two Soviet sattelites, which were enemy countries in the Second World War, have violated the the peace treaties they signed - treaties guaranteeing religious freedom.

The proposal was opposed when embittered fury by the delegates of Soviets and satellites.

Moscow delegate Jacob Malik shouted vituperation.

"The United Nations charter," he raged, "does not contemplate shielding criminals and traitors. There he went on: "This is an attempt to send the U N down the road of protecting crime and treason under the guise of protecting human rights and freedoms," he roared.

The steering committee disregarded all that, and voted overwhelmingly for a United Nations review of the cases of the Hungarian Cardinal and the Rulgarian

pastors.

The boviet delegate, at the same time, hurled Red invective against the North Atlantic Security Pact. He called the treaty a shield covering American aggression. And described the purpose of the Atlantic alliance in these words:

"the fulfillment of plans for world begemony toward which the leading circles of the United States are hurling themselves without any rhyme or reason."

In China, peace negotiations appear to be in a state of collapse -- with Red demands for unconditional surrender. The talks are going on in Peiping where the Communist leaders have confronted the Nationalist representatives with an ultimatum - unconditional surrender by next Tuesday; or, the Reds will launch an immediate offensive against the line of the Yangtze River - with the purpose of overwhelming the remainder of China.

News from the far north today, reminds us that yesterday was an anniversary -- the fortieth anniversary of the discovery of the North Pole, Admiral Peary reaching the top of the world. Most of us yourhon's think of it, but the Circumnaviagors did. That group send a special flag to the weather squadrons of the Air Force, in Alaska -- where, from far northern bases, they make regular flights to the region of the Pole. So today the word comes through how, on the anniversary of Peary's North Pole discovery, a B-29 flew one thousand eight hundred and twenty miles to the Pole and there it dropped the flag of the Circumnavigators Club of New York.

FLYING DISCS

This next item of news may possibly turn

out to deserve the headline - they have found a IP Q report that a flying dise has been www,flying dise. > which goes back to the sensation of tax last summer when the soaring saucers were reported far and wide, by many witnesses. MURDER

In the lore of crime one standard feature is 2 perfect murder. Detective story writers rack their ingenuity in devising clever tricks for committing a murder that cannot be detected. Often the devices are ultra-modern, scientific. But, from Albany, Missouri, the story today tells of the oldest of the old-fashioned, the simplicities of a farm.

Seven men are under arrest, implicated in the brutal murder of an eighty year old spinster on the farm where she lived. The crime was committed by robbers, the aged woman beaten to death. Her body was found in the barn and all was made to appear that she had we been trampled by the cattle. There was no suspicion of murder, the funeral was held and the supposition was -- an accident of cattle in the barn.

That was where the case would have rested, a perfect murder -- save for one thing. The loot the robbers took was a pm bucket full of money - bank rm notes. Those the aged spinster had kept for years, old fashioned max money, obsolete gold

certificates. These the robbers proceeded to spend, inthat way and they attracted attention -- because the bank notes were so long out of date. Arrests were made, the robbers giving the explanation -- they had taken the bucket full of money from the house of the victim, after the funeral which might still have left the murder a perfect crime- except for the fact that nephews of the aged woman had bearded up her home before the funeral, and the signs were that nobody could have broken in. That ruined the explanation, and the result of the inquiry broke in the news today - a charge of murder in the case that might have been the perfect crime, on the farm.

Anyone who is skeptical about there being a movement of population to our West Coast should visit the city of Compton. They are calling it the Hub out here in southern California. But it hasn't been a Hub very long. In Nineteen twenty, according to the Federal Census thanks there was a population of twelve hundred. But in Nineteen forty it had jumped to sixteen thousand and a recent special census shows that now it is somewhere between forty and fifty thousand — ten thousand more people having moved here during the past year. How's that for phenomenal growth? And it is a trading center for more than a hundred thousand southern Californians.

In Compton there is something electrical in the air.

The people tell you of their fifty major industries, the largest Sears Roebuck retail store on one floor in the country, and they are justly proud of the record made by their Number One Educational institution, Compton College. It won the National Junior college football championship last year. And in basketball it is now playing in the national semi-finals. And that brings us to another interesting figure. In Nineteen Twenty-seven -- only a few years ago - the college had sixty

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in attendance. Now it is over six thousand.

They had an earthquake in these parts in Nineteen
Thirty-three and allthere was of Compton at that time was
just about wiped off the mpa. But you should see it now!

In the world where the ball rolls wa down the alley and hits the pins, they are hailing - "the bowler of the year".

Same with Andy Varippa when he was being boosed. He turned to the hecklers and roared: "Okay, we'll start another game -- and this is it". And it was -- Andy bowling three hundred, the perfect pass.

Which brought down to the house with cheers.

In his long career, "the bowler of the year" has rolled sixty-five perfect games, every roll a ten strike, all the pins down every time, score three hundred. At fifty-four hailed as Number he had goes on, bragging and boasting and bowling.

But, when he gets to the coop, the third party to the pigeon triangle has been taken out, and all he finds is the Mamma bird.

whereupon he subsides, just goes strutting around maybe having won the race. Pigeons have a short
memory, they can play that same trick on the same
bird one time after another.

Another dee device is to take the Mamma bird from the eggs on which she is sitting, and transport her to the originating point of the race. She flies back as fast as she can to go on hatching her eggs.

But this is only done when the Mamma

bird feels life in the eggs -- which redoubles

her devotion to her domestic duty. To produce

that situation, the fanciers of pigeon racing

sometimes resort to a fake. They take the eggs,

drain them dry, and insert in each a couple of worms.

The worms wiggle, and that provides the sign of

life. The Mamma bird is fooled and assemble herself

mightily in in the race. Flying with that remarkable

homing instinct of the pigeons, she returns eagerly

⁻⁻ and goes on hatching worms. Sounds like a mean trick on the poor pigeon.
