AUGUSTA

TA Tula, May 12-70 today Georgia's Governor Lester Maddox, flew to the riot-torn city of Augusta - where hundreds of blacks roaming the streets after a night of burning, looting and sniping. Six persons killed - sixty injured - and some fifty buildings destroyed in the worst violence to hit an American city since the riots in Newark and Detroit a few years back. TORNADO Theusand injured At least twenty are deadfand property damage estimated at thirty-five-MILLION in t tornado to sweep Texas in nearly twenty years. Time and again the twister struck - bringing death and destruction last night along an eight-mile path in the West Texas city of Lubbock - population one-hundred-and-sixty-thousand at least ten-thousand of whom are homeless tonight. "It hit us where it hurts", says city Manager Bill Blackwell who surveyed the damage on the campus of Texas Tech also in the Mexican-American section, among downtown skyscrapers, and in the residential areas where national guardsmen are patrolling the streets to prevent looting.

INDOCHINA

In a new development, American and South Vietnamese naval units tonight are patrolling the Gulf of Siam along a fifty-mile stretch of the Cambodian coastline - to prevent supplies from reaching Communist forces on the The Saigon government calls it a "blockade" land. but American headquarters won't use that word - saying only that Communist supply ships are being stopped. that South Vietnamese folotilla which reached the capital city of Phnom Penh yesterday, is now reported to have sailed some fifty miles farther up the Mekong **River** to the provincial capital of Monpong Cham - a hundred miles from the Vietnamese border.

In Washington, Defense Secretary Metric Laird announced that "several thousand" American troops have already been withdrawn from Cambodia with more to be pulled back later this week. He also predicts our ground force missions in Vietnam itself would up -

of next year.

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A less optimistic view was offered today by retired General James Gavin who fears what he calls, the "frustrations of Vietnam" may led American military leaders into a fight with Communist China. Gavin - who opposes esculuting the war - told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee - "There's always a military officer somewhere who wants to win a battle by taking one more hill - or dropping one more bomb. And it's up to national leaders to know when to say yes - or no - in any given tactical situation." Gavin appeared as a witness after the committee approved a resolution .- aimed at stopping the expansion of military activity in Cambodia by cutting off The White House reportedly agrees to the funds. resolution - provided it does not weaken the President's consitututional authority to protect American troops. NIXON

President Nixon journeyed two blocks from the White House today to attend a meeting of the A-F-L - C-I-O there to Executive Council and explain his policy in Indochina. Labor leader George Meany warmly greeted him expressing his personal support for the military move in Cambodia. But he wasn't so agreeable on another subject - the nation's economy. Meany and the others complain bitteriy that the President's fight to curb inflation has boomeranged - leading the country into a recession. And they insisted that Congress should take over by imposing controls on credit, interest rates and business mergers.

MIDEAST

A heavily armed Israeli task force - supported by planes and artillery - struck across the Lebanese border before dawn in a mission against Arab guerrillas. As a result, Lebanese, Syrian and Iraqui forces fought back with the Querilla call it the biggest battle in the Mideast in three years. While the fighting raged around the foothills of Mount Hermon, the U-N Security Council held an emergency session in New York to hear complaints from both Israel and Lebanon. The Council demanded that Israeli withdraw its forces immediately. And a military spokesman in Tel Aviv says the task force is pulling back across the border and completion of a fourteen-hour

operation.

CRIME

Federal authorities say three-hundred F-B-I agents have carried out "the largest Federal gambling raid in history" - against a numbers racket in the Detroit area which handled more than ninety-MILLION dollars in bets each year. At least fifty-eight persons arrested - some forty-thousand dollars in cash and fifty-seven guns seized. The House Appropriations Committee, approved an outlay of four-hundred-eighty MILLION dollars to provide so-called "safe streets" financial aid to state and city governments. The was the full amount requested by the Justice Department to fight street crime, violence and drug addiction at the local level.

FRANCE

France is ordering all airlines and ships to stay out of its Pacific test grounds - while it renews nuclear testing this week. Radio Tahiti warns that the immediate danger area is a one-hundred-twenty-mile circle around the Mururoa Atolls - eight hundred miles southeast of Tahiti. The . French government, going ahead with the tests despite official protests from Japan, Australia and New Zealand.

FOREIGN AID

For quite a few years now the United States through foreign aid and other programs - has been trying to stimulate economic growth in underdeveloped countries around the world.
