THE AZORES

In the Azores - President Nixon met today with President Pompidou of France; the second of five so-called "little summits" - in preparation for the President's forthcoming trips to Peking and Moscow. Correspondents say topics discussed included world monetary problems; and, the Indian-Pakistani war. DACCA FOLLOW ANGRA

Speaking of which - Indian airborne units today were at the outer defenses of Dacca, capitol of East Pakistan. New Delhi says they are within six miles of down town Dacca, and now bringing up heavy artillery for a final assault.

Meanwhile Pakistan General Niaza, meeting with news men at the Dacca hotel, said he would sacrifice the city and all his troops - rather than surrender. Said the General - "these are the prices of freedom."

PRESIDENT

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The Azores again - President Nixon today welcomed as "an act of clemency" - Red China's decision to release those two American prisoners. And the fact that they will now be able to spend Christmas with their families -"a matter of particular pleasure" - said the White House. Adding that this - along with the shortening of a third prisoner sentence - was negotiated by Henry Kissinger during his two recent trips to Peking.

UNITED NATIONS

Another six month extension of the UN peace keeping mission in Cyprus - approved today by the UN Security Council. For the first time in <u>se</u> seven years though - the vote was not unanimous. Red China's ambassador "Huang Hua - refusing to take part in the balloting; refusing to do so - said he because of Peking's "well known stand on UN peace keeping operations, "as he put it. TEL AVIV

After twelve days here in the US - Madame Golda Meir returned to Tel Aviv, The Israeli premier telling reporters: "I hope you don't expect me to give you an accurate and detailed report of my talks." But she added: "I have a feeling that things have been clarified - and I hope consequently there will follow good deeds and consequences." That -

AMMAN

An article in the semi official Jordanian newspaper today says that Arab leaders - could be talking themselves into another war for which they are not prepared. It adds that - worse - this could also set the stage for another Israeli pre-emptive attack.

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DUBLIN

From the main branch of the IRA in Dublin a statement today admitting responsibility for the weekend slaying of northern Ireland's Senator John Barnhill. The IRA explaining that Senator Barnhill was "informed that his and house was to be destroyed," and have was asked to evacuate it along with his family." Adding however, the Senator "then attacked the raiding party - and in the mann-ensuing struggle received the wounds from which he died."

The statement also saying that Barnhill's home was selected for the raid --because he strongly supported a government policy of quote "repression and terrorism against the working class people of the North."

PHNOM PENH follow Saigon

At Phnom Penh, in neighboring Cambodia -- the start of a crash campaign aimed at cleaning up the army. Cambodian strong man Lon Nol -- ordering an on the spot census of each and **seer** every brigade; thereby attempting to determine which of his commanders -- have been filing inflated rosters, the better to pad their payrolls, expenses and so on.

The situation coming to a head last month we are told - when Phnom Penh was under heavy enemy pressure. Lon Nol summoning up his reinforcements -- only to discover that much of his strength existed only on paper.

CAPITAL HILL

Back In Washington - House and Senate conferees today approved a bill - giving President Nixon controls over the economy for another year. But the bill also providing retro-active pay **income** increases for many workers - and an on-time raise for **in** more than four million federal employees. PENTAGON

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At the Pentagon - where he served as number two man - a final press conference today for retiring David Packard; who said that "we still have too many military bases - despite many bases closed during recent

"There is no question we could make savings" perhaps as much as "a billion dollars a year," said Packard. But he added: "We have a great many political **contraints** constraints - as everybody knows, and these - virtually insurmountable.

GENERAL SARNOFF

I'm sure that by now you not only have heard of the passing of General Sarnoff one of the giants of our era, but over and over during the past twenty four hours you have heard the story of his life, his association with Marconi, the sinking of the Titanic, how he built his vast R C A empire, including the NBC and all the rest. So, I wonder what I can add, except to say that with his departure I have lost an old friend. -- For some sixteen years I was with him at NBC. But more than that, we were friends, not simply colleagues. I'll always see him as he was in one of our ball in one of my Nine Old Men, games; the Nine Old men pitted against a team captained and led by General Theodore Roosevelt. There was the eminent scientist. the genius of the business world, David Sarnoff, playing ball wearing a top coat -- which is quite a handicap on a ball field. I can still see him going around the bases with that top coat flapping.

I also remember the day he told some of us --Never invest in a dime in television. Why," did he say it? We said there were three starling problems that might not be solved for many years. One, was how to extend television from one city to another. It was before the coaxial cable. Second, the size of the screen which he thought, and many of we still think, too small. Third, he was sure that per television would devour entertainment with such tremendous gulps, creating a vast problems, of to produce how to build up enough worthwhile programs.
