This, the fifth straight time in recent months that American and allied troops have met and routed the
same enemy force. Communist losses in today's action totaling more than five hundred and twenty dead. A Marine
Commander remarking that "one of these days - they re
going to learn to keep the death out of our way."

Meanwhile, to the south -- U S jets today were blasting a Communist jungle hideout -- near the Saigon River, Early a couple of miles - from the heart of the capital. Shock waves from the attack - breaking windows and shaking buildings in the city itself.

PRESIDENT FOLLOW VIET NAM

Here at home -- President Johnson today predicting a pa practical solution to the political exnical crisis in South Viet Nam, as he put it -- "in good time". The President adding -- "a nation will be born -- a constitutional government will exist."

CALL FOLLOW RELIGION

In somewhal the same vein - an item today from Nha Trang, in Viet Nam: - Air Force Chaplan Captain Charles Prewitt disclosing a new use - for those airplanes equipped with big loudspeakers - normally employed in psychological warfare.

Captain Prewitt reporting that he now summons the faithful - by means of a weekly flight in one of the planes. His call to worship - starting out: "Hello, my people. This is the voice from above - watching thee."

A sure attention-getter - we re told. With attendance at services - showing a sudden increase.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk - headed home tonight from Turkey. His main mission at the just-concluded Cento Meeting - that of mending U S relations with Pakistan - apparently a success.

At a final news conference - Dean Rush reporting private talks with Pakistani Foreign Minister Zulfiqar Ali Bhutto, covering a wide range of topics - including the touchy question of Pakistan's increasingly-closer ties with Red China. These talks - said he - resulting in a "better understanding on certain points of view - on which there have been differences so in the past."

As for Viet Nam - Dean Rusk reasserting his contention that the only obstacle to peace talks - is Communist North Viet Nam. Said he: "I would be at Geneva tomorrow - if there were someone to talk to."

At Rome -- agreement today on a new scientific and technical exchange treaty -- between Italy and Russia. The pact approved by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko -- and his Italian counterpart -- Amintore Fantani. Clearing the way for scheduled talks -- on problems of disarmament -- the spread of nuclear weapons -- plus European and world security.

Gromyko also expected to seek an audience with Pope Paul.

The militant anti=Communist Indonesian student organization - adopting a five-point resolution, heartily endorsing the new regime of Lieutenant General Sufarto - and urging a thorough review of all past presidential decrees; Meaning those of Sukarno - when he was in absolute command.

Similar xxxx resolutions - also circulated among other anti-Communist leaders; to be presented to the new cabinet - at a mass rally tomorrow at Government headquarters.
