The Yalta papers were ready for publication in December. But the British were opposed. So the publication was held up until now.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, today, explained: "The general reaction in Congress was to publish them - rather than to hold them on a restricted basis. This was the view of both Republicans and Democrats," the Secretary added.

We hear there was another reason for the date of publication - nine P.M. last evening. Two New York newspapers had procured copies, were about to print them.

Today, Secretary of State Dulles was asked would the publicationdend the controversy over Yalta? He replied: "I expect the controversy to go on through the ages."

The publication of the Yalta Papers makes no hit with the sole survivor of that famous Roosevelt-Churchill-stalin meeting. In London, Prime Minister Churchill is - thoroughly displeased. In the House of Commons, today, he made frosty remarks. Which add up - to the following.

Churchill consented to this American publication reluctantly. Being told - that the **r** secret record would be given out in Washington, anyway. The word in London is that the British Government was informed, only twenty-four hours in advance, of the decision to publish.

The Yalta Fapers are a mammoth production. The With the Yalta Matter New York Times, prints more than thirty newspaper pages, Inter-I've been wading through that ocean of words, today - and the general picture comes out pretty clearly.

At that Roosevelt-Churchill-Stalin meeting, ten years ago, there were three principal points of discussion - the Far East, the question of Poland, the future of defeated Germany.

The U.S. Chiefs-of-Staff wanted to get Soviet Russia into the war against Japan. That has been stated previously. Now - the secret memoranda show that, weeks before Yalta, Stalin - had agreed. Moreover, President Franklin D. Roosevelt had a secret report - indicating that the atomic bomb was about ready to do its devastating work. That was the background for a talk between Roosevelt and Stalin. Churchill - not present.

Stalin made demands, and F.D.R. agreed, pretty much, with what he wanted. Which concerned islands, the Kuriles and

Sakhalin. But, most of all - Manchuria. The harbor of Dairen, the Port Arthur naval base. And - control of Manchurian railroads. F.D.R. suggested ways by which this could be arranged. This resulted in - Soviet control of Manchuria. Which played a great part in the rise of Red China.

Chiang Kai-shek had not been consulted, when F.D.R. The President/ made Manchurian arrangements with Stalin. told Stalin this repeatedly. Although, of course, they were dealing with property - which, theoretically, was Chinese. And Chiang Kai-shek was our ally. It was agreed that Chiang's consent should be obtained - later on. As for Poland - that was principally a battle between Stalin and Churchill. With Churchill - partition and xaxious and stubbour xbattikes trying to procure freedom for Poland. But in vain. President Roosevelt was concerned about the Polish vote in the United States. Saying - he wanted a "gesture" to pacify the Polish-Americans. 

As for Germany, the secret record presents a pitiful picture - of vain and futile projects. The Roosevelt-Churchill-

Stalin conference agreed - that Germany should be broken up. Divided - into separate sections. Each - an independent state. Also - that Germany should pay tremendous reparations to Soviet Russia. Billions - in the form of merchandise. And forced labor.

The discussions regarding Germany have a sardonic sound, these days. For example, one Stalin suggestions - with which F.D.R. agreed. That, after the final defeat of Germany, fifty thousand German officers should be executed.

The charges are made that Stalin got all he demanded at Yalta. Well, he didn't get all. But he did get a lot. In return he gave promises mostly - which were never kept.

One curious feature is, the prominence of the name of Alger Hiss in the secret Yalta documents. Hiss - later sent to prison for perjury in connection with Communist espionage. Much information now disclosed is derived from notes made by Alger Hiss - who was a member of the American delegation at

Yalta. Hiss, exceedingly busy apparently, in keeping up the record. Tonight, Alger Hiss, acknowledged that he was the author of one Yalta memorandum - in which he argued against giving the Soviets three votes in the U.N.

That's a quick resume - after wading through that ocean of words, the secret record of the Yalta Conference.

#### EISENHOWER

In Nineteen Fifty-Two, a group of prominent Republicans met with General Eisenhower, and urged him to be the Republican candidate for President. General Ike listened, and was -- non-commital. Later, of course, he did head the Republican ticket.

Today, that same group met with President Eisenhower at lunch in the White House. Their purpose - of a similar sort. Now - urging him to be the Republican candidate again. So what reply did they get?

Well, they got an invitation back to lunch next year, in the Spring of Nineteen Fifty-Six. When - they may learn more. The Fresident - putting matters off until a year from now.

One of the luncheon guests, Congressman Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, said: "The President commented that the state of the world, next Spring - might cause him to have something to say one way or the other." EARTHQUAKE.

The Navy has warned all ships - in the area of Hawaii. Telling them - there's likely to be a huge tidal wave.

stopped the game. Awarding it to Detroit - on a forfeit. Which put the Redskins ahead one game. With only two games to go - ending the season.

There's wonder and mystification in the old city of Naples. Because of what seems to be - a sort of modern miracle.

Every day, crowds of shabbily dressed people, the needy and hungry, go to a humble home, in a poor section of Naples. There they find a veritable banquet - awaiting them. Gallons of soup, piles of cheese, baskets of fruit.

All - provided by a benevolent character with a white beard. Who, so far as anyone can tell - is a bankrupt, stone broke. When asked - where does he get the money for all the charity? He replies - "Providence."

Twenty-four years ago, Teodoro Mandato went from Naples to Rome - where he became a rag picker. In a dozen years - he was rich. With a huge business - dealing in rags. Living in a sumptuous villa, with servants, automobiles. Then, because of matters connected with Fascism and war, his fortune collapsed - and he was bankrupt. He went back to Naples, to his old neighborhood. Telling people - he was as penniless as when

he left.

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A couple of years ago, his daughter Rosa quit school suddenly, and went into solitude - in a room in the family have home. Wearing - a flowing white robe. Her father says: "Rosa lives a supernatural life."

Soon afterward, the miracle of charity began. The bankrupt rag man - opening his house, every day, to the poor. Providing them - with abundant food. He explains: "Through my daughter, I have been informed by the Most High - that I must help the poor." But where he gets: the money - is a mystery.

Church authorities began an investigation. But, thus far, have made no statement. Either they re still investigating, or have found a satisfactory explanation - and have dropped the matter. Of this apparent miracle - which sounds rather like the Miracle of the Loaves and the Fishes.
