CAPITOL HILL

In a packed hearing room on Capitol Hill - an historic first today; President Ford the nation's first Chief Executive ever to submit to formal interrogation by a Congressional body. Testifying for nearly two hours before a House subcommittee - on why he pardoned former President Nixon.

In his opening statement the President saying:

"The reason I gave the pardon was not for Mr. Nixon

himself - but to try and get the United States, the Congress

the President and the American people - focused on the

serious problems we have at home and abroad." "I wanted

to do all I could" - he continued - "to shift our attentions

from the pursuit of a fallen President - to the pursuit of

the urgent needs of a rising nation." Then adding: "We

would needlessly be diverted from meeting these challenges."

- if we as a people were to remain sharply divided over whether to indict, bring to trial and punish a former President;" a man "who already is condemned to suffer long and deeply."

Then followed a series of questions; including one from Congressman Holtzman of New York - suggesting the possibility of a "deal." The President rather gruffly telling Miss Holtzman: "I want to assure you and members of this subcommittee, members of the Congress and the American people - that there was no deal - period! under no circumstances!"

The President also denied that he had been told Mr.

Nixon might commit suicide - if he were forced to stand

trial. The former President's health - having no bearing

- said he. Insisting again he had not granted the pardon

"for Mr. Nixon's benefit - but for the country."

This no doubt one of the most dramatic events in our history.

Here in New York - the wife of Vice Presidentnominee Nelson Rockefeller - forty-eight-year-old Happy
Rockefeller - was operated on today for breast cancer. The
doctors performing a radical mastectomy - much the same
as they did in the case of First Lady Betty Ford less than
three weeks ago.

A later report saying the malignancy in Mrs.

Rockefeller - had not spread to her lymph system. Doctors adding that her condition - is now "excellent;" and the outlook for full recovery - also, "excellent - over ninety per cent."

SCOTT FOLLOW ROCKEFELLER

Back in Washington - Senator Scott of Virginia, a

Republican, today became the first member of the Senate
to say he would vote against Rockefeller for Vice President.

Scott saying his decision was based to a great extent - on

Rechifelier's role in the publication of that Goldberg book.

Adding that his mail was running eights-five per cent against confirmation.

The Senator also sending a letter to President Ford urging withdrawal of the Rockefeller nomination; saying it
"could revive - much of the Watergate atmosphers."

At the Watergate cover-up trial - tape

recordings of White House conversations were played in

public today - for the first time. Not a great deal & that

we haven't already heard about. Except at one point,

Richard Nixon and key advisers agreeing that then-House

Minority Leader Gerald Ford - should head off a House

investigation. He obviously didn't.

On another front, Judge Sirica saying he thinks the former President - should be compelled to testify.

But he postponed a formal ruling - pending a further report on Mr. Nixon's health.

After another veto - again sustained in the House at last, a compromise on the "no aid to Turkey bill." The President and Congressional leaders - agreeing to a continuation of U.S. aid to Turkey 'till December Tenth.

This providing that no American "implements of war" - are transmitted to Cyprus; and that Turkey observe the Cyprus cease-fire - and send in no more troops.
