

MARIST FROSH BEST SEASON EVER


The 1972 edition of the Marist College Freshmen Crew Team enjoyed the best season ever by capturing first place in the Dad Vail Regatta (National Small-College Championships and by finishing respectable eleventh at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association Championships. (National Major-College Championships).

The Frosh, under the direction of Coach Bill Lenehan posted an outstanding 43-1 season won-lost record. The lone loss came at the hands of Marietta College, that loss was later avenged at the Dad Vail. The Frosh began their 1972 season with a victory in the Spring Fever Regatta at Wesleyan. It was here that Marist held off early challenges by Wesleyan and Massachusetts to capture the event. The following weekend saw the young oarsmen compete in two dual regatta's back to back. First came an easy victory over Stockton State, and then a disappointing loss to Marietta.

The loss seemed to provide an impetus rather than a discouragement, as the young Red Foxes captured the Hartford Regatta the following weekend. It was in this race that the Frosh were beginning to show signs of greatness. Their victories over Trinity and Ithaca were recorded as firsts in the school history.

Marist then returned to their home waters with a victory in Marist's own President's Cup. After the President's Cup victory, Marist was to face their stiffest competition in two succesive weekends. The Frosh captured both the Rusty Callow Regatta (The New England Championships) and the Dad Vail Regatta on successive weekends.

Frost Coach Bill Lenehan, feels that this was the best crew he has had in his four years as Frosh coach. "Besides being the best team in ability, this team also had more, hustle, determination and desire than any other. Those men were winners."

History

Marist is a liberal arts college for men and women founded in 1929. By 1946, the school had achieved four-year status as a liberal arts institution receiving its permanent charter from the State of New York in 1950. In the past few years, the freshman class has numbered close to 400 men and women. Such rapid increase in numbers has been made possible only by a ten-year building program that has resulted in a campus presently worth over 11 million dollars.

Although its expansion has been rapid, the Board of Trustees expects to limit the size of Marist to about 1500 full-time students. The Board feels this size is sufficient to maintain the extensive liberal arts program, yet retain the many virtues of a small college.

Location

Marist College, located one mile north of Poughkeepsie, New York, lies between the Hudson River and Route 9, the major north-south route east of the Hudson. The college is within two hours' ride from New York City by railroad, bus, or car. The Poughkeepsie station of the Penn-Central Railroad is less than five minutes' drive from Marist.

Campus

The 100 acre campus contains an outdoor swimming pool, which can be converted to a skating rink, and waterfront facilities for crew. There are athletic fields, handball and basketball courts to support the Intramural sports program. Leonidoff Field, in operation since the Fall of 1968, is used for varsity soccer and club football games.

1973 VARSITY PROSPECTUS

Head Coach Bill Austin gets right down to the facts when you ask him about his 1973 crew. "We are more experienced than we were last season, and we also had five good weeks of rowing in our fall season," he said. We are also looking towards a successful conditioning and training session during the winter months.

"I am pleased with our progress so far. We are ahead of last year's pace. One major reason for that progress has been stronger competition for positions. This always develops improvement."

"I feel we are stronger, but our schedule is also stronger." Austin added. "We will not have any easy races this season, but rather we will be competing with some of the finest crews in the nation. For this reason, it is hard for me to make any predictions concerning our record for this year."

Marist has ten returnees form last season's varsity crew in co-captains Joe McHugh and Jim Cockcroft, along with John Wilson, Joe Puvogel, Tim Petrone, John Lyons, Steve McDermott, Bob Creedon, Ken Ousey and coxswain Mike Hawd. Seventeen sophomores, including the Dad Vail Championship Eight, will also be battling for starting position.



BILL AUSTIN

In a recent review of questionnaires that were filled out by members of the Marist College Crew, the one fact that stood out was the tremendous respect that the Red Foxes have for Head Coach Bill Austin.

Austin, was appointed Head Coach in September of 1968 and is currently in his fifth season as the Head Coach of Crew.

Bill graduated from Trenton State University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Physical Education in 1965. He received his Master's Degree in Physical Education from Indiana University in June of 1967.

Bill is married and he and his wife, Jane, reside in Pleasant Valley with their daughter, Kimberly, age 3.

BILL LENEHAN
